MILWAUKIE FARE IN SUPREME COURT

Officials of the Portland Railway, Light & Power company do not want to give a 5 cent fare between Milwaukie and Portland. That fact has been known for some time, ever since and before the people of Milwaukie took the question up with the railroad commission. The commission decided that 5 cents was enough to entitle a person to ride between the two places and the matter was taken into the circuit court. This court held with the commission. And now the people of the little city up the river have been informed by the commission that the company has appealed to the supreme court.

Milwaukie citizens are now busy preparing figures, statistics and arguments together with funds, which will be put in the hands of the lawyer representing them for submission to the supreme court. Both sides expect to fight the thing out to a finish. In the meantime the company is taking full fare, but is issuing receipts so that in the event the court holds with the commission and for the city it will stand to refund something like \$100,000 to it by the Portland-Milwaukie passengers.
