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YOUNG JOINS VANISHING WITNESSES

BATTLE FOR HONORS IN PRIMARIES

Close Contests in Michigan, Wisconsin and Nebraska—Bradley Wins in First Mentioned State—Jenkins Loses to Lenroot.

Stevenson Is Successful Against Three Contestants—Shallenberger Will Get the Democratic Nomination for Governor.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Detroit, Mich., Sept. 2.—With 300 districts missing at noon today the results from yesterday's primaries indicate that Auditor-General J. B. Bradley has won the Republican nomination for governor over Governor Fred M. Warner by a majority of 2,900.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Milwaukee, Wis., Sept. 2.—Complete returns today from the Republican primaries held in Wisconsin yesterday show that Senator Isaac Stephenson has won the Republican nomination for reelection to the United States senate by several thousand majority over his opponents, William Hatton, Samuel A. Cook, and Francis G. McGovern.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Milwaukee, Wis., Sept. 2.—Partially complete returns today indicate that Congressman John J. Jenkins, chairman of the judiciary committee of the house of representatives, has been defeated for re-nomination by Irvine Lenroot, of Superior, formerly speaker of the state assembly.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Omaha, Neb., Sept. 2.—The primary returns, coming in slowly from the state, at noon today indicate that former Congressman A. C. Shallenberger has won the Democratic nomination for governor of Nebraska.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Boise, Idaho, Sept. 2.—The second day of the Republican state convention began with much uncertainty as to nominees for minor state offices. During the night a movement was started to defeat French for congress. The only nomination made yesterday was that of W. B. Heyburn for United States senator.

France Wants to Purchase Airships From Americans



The famous Wright brothers' aeroplane, recently given a government test at Fort Myer, has been bought by the French government. This news reached here yesterday and waits confirmation today. Their heavier-than-air airship, in flight, is shown at top. The above picture shows Wilbur Wright seated in it. Below this is a snapshot of his brother, Orville Wright, who is to conduct the experiments at Fort Myer.

Wilbur Wright has conquered France as he has partially conquered the air. His success is the reward of a lifetime's effort and systematic study of this difficult problem.

So much has been written about the Wright brothers and their invention, most of which has originated in the fertile brains of newspaper correspondents, that the world has received an entirely erroneous conception not only of the airship itself, but of the Wright brothers.

The Wright brothers have undoubtedly given newspaper men very little satisfaction as regards interviews and have in the past conducted secret tests of their machine. Further than this they have had a distinct aversion to photographs being taken of the machine. 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BEHEADED BODY THAT OF WOMAN

Sound Police Face Profound Mystery Consequent Upon Startling Discovery Made by Hunters Near Juanita, Washington.

Four Gold Teeth Only Distinctive Marks, and No Wounds Ascertainable—Conjectural Connection With Everett Case.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Seattle, Wash., Sept. 2.—No deeper mystery has ever confronted the Seattle police department than that surrounding the identity and manner of death of the unknown woman whose remains were found on the northern shore of Lake Washington near Juanita yesterday afternoon. It was not until the officers arrived on the scene that it was discovered the victim of what was undoubtedly one of the most brutal murders in the annals of criminal history in the northwest was a woman.

The body was buried under a pile of logs, the head being four feet and a half away. Apparently the woman had been dead for four or five months. There were no marks of any sort by which identification is possible except that the woman had four gold teeth and an immense quantity of hair, now turning gray, but apparently originally of a light brown tint.

FUMES OF PITCH STRANGLE FOUR

Seamen Overcome on Board British Bark Puritan at Boston.

GASPPE MURDER CASE EVIDENCE IS WEAKENED

Jack La Rose May Go Free If the State Should Be Unable to Bring Missing Man Back to Oregon—Cameron Thinks He Can Produce Him.

Harry Young, one of the chief witnesses for the state in the case against Jack La Rose, charged with killing H. Neuman with a gas pipe, is the latest man to drop out of sight. If he does not appear to testify against La Rose the state's case will be greatly weakened, and another man charged with a heinous crime may go free because the evidence is not strong enough to convict.

For some time after the arrest of La Rose, Young was detained at the county jail. Then he was released on promise to report to the district attorney once each week. District Attorney Cameron today stated that he has not reported for about a month, but the district attorney says that Young can be produced when the time comes. He said he would not care to state for publication where Young is.

BOND MYSTERY UNSOLVED

President of Paint Company Draws Down \$1,000 Deposited to Insure Radding's Return—Refuses to Tell Source—Mrs. Waymire May Forfeit.

E. E. Radding, whose sentence of six months in jail for conspiring to injure the reputation of Mayor Lane was affirmed by the supreme court last week, appeared at the court house this morning to surrender himself. At the same time appeared George Armstrong, president of the New Era Paint & Varnish company, with papers to show that he is authorized to draw down the \$1,000 bond deposited with the county clerk for Radding's appearance.
