COPPER ENOUGH TO SUPPLY WORLD

It won't be many years until all the railroads in this part of the country will be electric lines. This statement was made yesterday by H. H. Grigg, copper mining man in the states now for the purpose of organizing his new company and exploiting his holdings in the Copper River country. "The lines would all be electric lines now if it were not for the fact that the copper cannot be obtained," Mr. Grigg went on. "Mr. Harriman would be only too glad to change his system to electrical if he could. But there isn't enough copper now and the price is prohibitive. But this will all be changed when the copper from the Copper River country comes on the market. And that won't be long. The Guggenheim-Morgan-Rockefeller line will be in there about a year from now and then the country will be the greatest mining region the world has ever seen. I have put in eight years there without taking out a pound of copper, and I would put in eight more before I would turn loose of my holdings. I tell you, that is the only country today for a man with any energy about him. I would rather land on the wharf at Valdez in a pair of overalls than take the best position that could be offered me in this country. There is more copper in the Copper River country than anywhere else in the world. Hirsch & Co., the South African firm, paid \$1,500,000 for only 40 per cent interest in one claim up there. Another sold for \$10,000,000. And not long ago stock in those same claims was selling for 10 cents a share, because the holders had to have money to get their provisions and machinery in."

SWETT AND PRICE CLOSE TO BLOWS

Isaac Swett, who last week was acting municipal judge, but is now practicing law again, and Detective Price nearly came to blows in the police court this morning because Swett questioned Price's statement that his client had confessed to the larceny of a shotgun. The client was Thomas Griffin, an umbrella repairer. Swett stated that Griffin had come to him when he learned he might be arrested and explained the circumstances. He was released on his own recognizance and appeared in court this morning for trial. Price declared Griffin had confessed the theft to him. Swett declared that Griffin was deaf and had not understood the officer's question. After a lively exchange on the stand the dispute was continued outside the courtroom, but it was finally agreed there had been a misunderstanding all around. Griffin was discharged. The complainant was W. H. Harrison.

STATE LAND BOARD'S REPORT SHOWS BIG INCREASE IN SALES

(Salem Bureau of The Journal.) Salem, Or., Sept. 3.—G. G. Brown, clerk of the land board, turned over to the state treasurer yesterday \$21,464.64, the income of that office during August. The sum was made up as follows: Common school fund principal, payments on certificates and cash sales, \$14,991.91; \$46.60; swamp land fund principal, \$480. common school fund principal, payments on sales of land acquired by deed or foreclosure, \$3,244.67; common school fund interest, payments on certificates, \$2,464.23; common school fund interest, rents and payments on sales of land acquired by deed or foreclosure, \$214.23; swamp land fund interest, certificates and cash sales, \$14,991.91; \$46.60; swamp land fund principal, \$480.

Receipts from sales during August were \$71,148.80, which considerably exceeds the common school fund principal. On August 1 the balance in this principal was \$516,638.32.
