

ALBUQUERQUE AS VOTER

Election of Van Buren in 1836 Was but a Ratified Appointment—Stormy Term and Campaign—Framing a Panic.

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Washington, Sept. 2.—Martin Van Buren was practically appointed by Andrew Jackson to succeed him in the White House, but the appointment did not take effect until after it had been ratified by the people at an election which marked the close of one of the most bitterly contested campaigns of our history. The reelection of Jackson in 1832 upon the issue of his veto of the bill to recharter the Bank of the United States had practically destroyed the National Republican party. So in 1834 the elements of opposition to Jackson organized under the name of Whigs, which, to some extent, had been the popular appellation of the National Republicans. Henry Clay was the heart and soul of the new party, but it could not waste even its opposition to Van Buren.

In all the northern states but Massachusetts the Whigs elected Daniel Webster as the candidate. In the South, except South Carolina, Senator Hugh Lawson White was elected. White was leading the anti-Jackson battles. South Carolina was looking out for itself, the legislature ready to instruct electors to vote for anybody to defeat Jackson's man Van Buren. If the anti-Van Buren leaders had managed to get a majority of the electoral votes they would have deserted their candidates to combine upon Clay or some other leader, but that scheme was never put into effect. Van Buren had a clear majority of both popular and electoral votes and Andrew Jackson's administration was once more endorsed.

Jackson Tremendously Elected.
The second Jackson administration had been even more stormy than the first. After Jackson was re-elected the attitude of the opposition was reflected by such papers as the Boston Courier, which said: "There is one constant fear in the mind of the people, and that is, that the days of the wicked shall be short; the wicked is old and feeble and he may die before he can be inaugurated. It is the duty of every good Christian to pray to our maker to have pity on us."
South Carolina found out for certain that Jackson was re-elected by the middle of November, 1832, and on November 23 the famous ordinance of nullification was passed. The tariff administration was largely the work of Henry Clay and had not had much support from Jackson. But Calhoun and the nullifiers in fighting the tariff, declaring it unconstitutional and null and void, were in the same political bed with Van Buren as opposition to Jackson was conceded.

Bank Question Still Main Issue.
The burning words of Jackson's proclamation of December 10 constituted the first great and broad center of the right of a state to oppose its allegiance to the power of the federal government, and Jackson's stand on that question saved the Union. But the nullification question was one which affected only a small portion of the people. The bank question was a national wide issue. The bill to recharter the bank had been vetoed during the campaign of 1832 and the voters had ratified the veto. Van Buren had to make a strenuous effort to elect Clay. It did not take Jackson long to decide to use all his power to end the bank. He had a charter for its charter to expire in 1836. His secretary of the treasury, William J. Duane, would not order the removal of the national bank without authority from congress. He also refused to resign his position. Van Buren then gave the national bank portfolio given to Roger B. Taney of Maryland, who had been attorney-general. Taney removed the deposits and in a few years he was rewarded by appointment to be chief justice of the supreme court.

First Surplus in Treasury.
Strictly speaking, the deposits were not removed from the bank. Incoming funds were deposited in certain state banks and receipts for the money were sent to the treasury. The United States bank was gradually exhausted by drafts for current expenses. The selection of certain state banks as depositories gave rise to charges of favoritism and in the campaign of 1836 much was made of "Jackson's Pets," as such banks were called. Other charges were these radical things and the entire destruction of the financial system upon which the country had been conducted, even to the point where the people were more prosperous than ever before, the government was in better financial condition than at any time before or since in its history. By January, 1835, the national debt was all paid off and the country had to face the question of what to do with the surplus revenue.

A Hand-Out to the States.
It was finally decided to distribute it among the states in proportion to their representation in congress. The states were to receive for money some \$28,000,000 in the aggregate, as if they were deposits, but everybody understood that the money was to be paid back to the treasury. The distribution was to be in four installments. Three were paid, but the panic of 1837 prevented the fourth. Some states built public buildings with the money. Maine divided it among the people, and other states used it for the basis of a school fund, as which it still exists. As late as 1883 the state of Virginia attempted to expend the fourth installment, but was unsuccessful. The treasury of the United States still carries that \$28,000,000 in cash books as an unavailable fund. Whatever may have come of all these things in after years, to the people in 1836 it looked good.

Tennessee Deserts Jackson.
To their eyes Jackson was still a hero and he was a statesman. Jackson said Van Buren was the man to succeed him, and they were led by Hugh Lawson White. White was not a paid backer of Jackson. He had punished the bank, which the people called the British bank, because much of the stock was owned abroad. He had paid off the national debt and had remitted a large amount of money collected as indirect tax, directly to the people. Everybody was speculating and getting rich quick. That was the danger, but they didn't see it ahead of them. So it was that when the votes were counted Van Buren had more than Harrison. White and Webster and Massachusetts and Carolina each candidate all put together.

To Andrew Jackson it was a great triumph, but there was a thorn in the crown of roses. Tennessee's own state had deserted him. The anti-Jackson forces were led by Hugh Lawson White. So earnestly did Old Hickory go into the campaign that he had articles printed in Washington papers denouncing White and then franked them under his own signature to members of the legislature. He had a great deal to say about a president should do such a thing in these days. In this campaign White carried more than 20,000 votes. That was all and was won over to Jackson, and he never could become re-elected to the senate.

HOUSE BODS SHEER NERVE BRINGS GRANTS PASS BOY FROM DEATH'S PORTALS

from a 15-20-caliber rifle, and went through the lad's stomach and also penetrated his hand. He was in a crouching position when shot, and being unable to walk, and too heavy for his friend to carry, was obliged to lie in the brush for several hours while Littlefield ran to the nearest house for aid. He was brought to the hospital in this city the day following the accident. On account of the extreme seriousness of his wound, the surgeons did not believe he would live. But the lad declined to

Fred N. Hamilton, football player and jewelry store burglar, passed away at the Mountain View sanitarium yesterday afternoon, as announced in the 5:30 o'clock Journal sporting extra. His death came from peritonitis, the direct result of injuries to the head received in playing football. It was this same hurt that is supposed to have caused his mental irresponsibility and made him a burglar. He was captured after midnight on July 14, following the robbery of three jewelry stores he had just entered. He escaped trial for the crimes because the alienists declared him insane and County Judge Webster committed him to the sanitarium, where, as it has proved, only a few weeks of life were left to him.
