

GARBED AS SISTERS BY DENIED BY CATHOLIC CLERGY

Two women, garbed as nuns of the order of St. Benedictine, have stirred up strife in the peaceful little suburb of Oak Grove and have caused unwanted ripples to stir the calm of the diocese of Oregon. These two women, one of whom has passed the zenith of life, Sister Gertrude, the other young with eyes of Celtic gray and most engaging address, Sister Mary, are at the head of the Oak Grove Sanatorium, which has been in the past an incurable consumptive. That they have not done their work well is not charged, but it is contended that the two women are not here by the authority of the Catholic church, that they are not Benedictine sisters, are therefore not entitled to the people to whom they appeal for contributions, and are operating without the authority of Archbishop Christie or any Catholic authority.

BLOCH OUT OF HOCK BUT FORGETFUL OF WOMAN STILL IN CITY

Though Jacob A. Bloch, the ex-banker, through whom she got into trouble, is out on bail, Malvina Weiss, the woman with whom he left Portland, is still in the city jail. The strange part of it is that Mrs. Weiss came to Portland on her accord, as she was given her liberty when arrested in Seattle with Bloch. She declares she was told by persons in Seattle that she would not be molested in Portland and accordingly followed Bloch and the detective to this city. A few hours after her arrival she was arrested on a statutory charge, and has been in jail ever since. The hearing of the charge of polygamy preferred against Bloch, whose true name is understood to be Barabas, the name under which he has been booked in the municipal court, has been set for September 10. Mrs. Weiss has been arrested on a charge of being a prostitute since Bloch was set free Tuesday, but this far her bail money has not been forthcoming. In addition to the \$10,000 she is known to the business world of Astoria, she has \$1,000 in bonds put up by C. H. Morrison and H. J. H. When Bloch left the jail he declared he believed the case would not be pushed in court. He was, however, under the derision of the police, and has been hunting him for many months. He was one of the founders of the Astoria Hotel, and under the former management, and later connected with several promotion enterprises about the city.

PORTLAND BOY IN AVIATOR CLASS

(United Press Leased Wire.) Ithaca, N. Y., Sept. 3.—Two students of Cornell university, John C. Burkhardt of Portland, Or., and Oscar Troholt of Indianapolis, Ind., have started aeronautic investigators with an aeroplane, built by them, which is capable of traveling 41 miles an hour at a height of 51 feet above the ground. In tests of the machine made in a field on the edge of the campus, the machine perfectly, remaining in the air for several minutes under absolute control of the operator. It sailed gracefully a distance of over a mile without the slightest mishap, the operator being able to rise and lower it at will. After ordering the machine to fly in a circle, it alighted gently like a great bird near the starting point. The young inventor were enthusiastically congratulated on their success. The machine is built on two horizontal wings, long and five feet apart. Its frame is of aluminum and is extremely light. It was built by an Oregon boy who has all the aeronautic experiments at the age of 10 years at Albany, Or., when his father, a well-known inventor, gave him a large airplane. FLAMES DESTROY HOTEL AND BARN

Frederick, Or., Sept. 3.—In a fire which destroyed the six-story hotel and barn, the loss is estimated at \$15,000. Let West Virginia Alone.

(United Press Leased Wire.) New York, Sept. 3.—As the result of the hearing before a subcommittee of the Republican national committee today a bitter fight is expected in West Virginia between the Swisher and Scherer factions of the party in their contest for control. The last presidential electors will be allowed to appear on both tickets, which means in effect that the national organization will take no part on one side or the other and leave it to the state leaders to fight it out between themselves. Each side sought the support of the national committee and each wanted to shut the other out of recognition.

G. O. P. Spellbinders.

Chicago, Sept. 3.—Chairman Hitchcock of the Republican national committee is planning a grand speaking tour for four presidential aspirants who opposed Taft for the nomination. The combination will be Fairbanks, Knox and La Follette. The Republican leaders believe that this combination will present a strong argument in favor of the ticket by the mere fact that they are all working together, in addition to their individual powers as stump campaigners. Before leaving here for Maine, Hitchcock will complete the arrangements for this campaign feature and it will mark the launching of the actual campaign contest before the people at large.

Seneca Fouts Says Radding's Thousand-Dollar Forfeit Was Contributed by More Than Score of Persons—Contest in Circuit Court.

A contest in the circuit court over the \$1,000 ball money put up for E. E. Radding to guarantee his appearance when wanted is now threatened. A local attorney this morning notified County Clerk Fields, who has the money in charge, not to pay out the money on the order of Attorney Seneca Fouts, who deposited it, because it belongs to W. R. McGarry, who appeared as attorney for Radding.

On the other hand, Mr. Fouts declares that he personally raised the money deposited as ball for both Radding and for Mrs. Belle Wayne, who were jointly convicted of conspiring to defame Mayor Lane, \$1,700 in all, and that he secured it from 25 or 30 different persons. Mr. McGarry, he says, did not contribute one cent and has no claim whatever on the money.

His Reorganized Army Decisively Defeats That of Mulai Hafid, the Usurper—Doubtful If the Victory Will Be of Avail.

Tangier, Morocco, Sept. 3.—The reorganized army of the deposed sultan, Abdul Aziz, has defeated the army of Mulai Hafid, the usurper, in a terrific battle, according to advices received here today, but with such heavy loss that he will be unable to follow up his advantage. The sultan's army, however, is said to be in a state of complete demoralization and is expected to be abandoned to the victors.

STONEHOUSES FOR PACKING TOWN

Stephenson of the construction department of Swift & Co., is in Portland prepared to let the contract for the erection of 20 two-story stone dwellings at Kenwood, the new Swift townsite on the Peninsula. These residences are to be occupied by the general officers of the big Peninsular packing plant. Later on the company will erect 200 more frame cottages to be occupied by the packing house employees.

LABOR'S DEMAND IN CALIFORNIA

Gompers, arrived here this afternoon to present two planks to the state Democratic convention. They will demand planks calling for the eight-hour day on all state work and for the business men's convention plank adopted at the Denver convention. It is probable that their planks will be incorporated in the platform.

SORRY NOW SHE HAD HIM ARRESTED

Mrs. Mamie Rendy has retracted her charges that M. C. Benbow embezzled \$200 that she had given him for investment and the case against him in the justice court has been dismissed. Benbow, who is president of the Commercial Abstract company, spent several uncomfortable hours in jail last Saturday evening before he was released on bail. She says that he invented part of the money that he received from Mrs. Rendy and used another part to buy a car and that his arrest was a mistake. Mrs. Rendy today gave the following signed statement regarding the matter: "In justice to Mr. Benbow, I beg to state that his arrest last Saturday upon my charges was the result of a misunderstanding. I wish also to state that Mr. Benbow did not promise me \$100 per month for the use of \$200. Mr. Benbow is absolutely innocent of any crime and it is due to him that I make these statements and thus do all I can to right any wrong that may have been done him. I regret the whole affair exceedingly and I would never have brought the proceedings had I understood."

Phelan and other leaders, Cole agreed to practically abdicate his post as a member of the national committee. He will appoint a committee of three as an advisory committee and will do nothing without their sanction. All money handled by Cole will go through the hands of this committee. The committee will in reality be appointed by Bell. It is stated on good authority that James D. Phelan and Judge James E. McGuire will do nothing but will be members of the committee. By ousting Cole, Bell is revenged for the action of the California Democrats who selected Cole over Bell in the Democratic convention at Denver.

Railroad Wizard Forestalls Any Pomp in His Visit to Portland—To Meet Business Men Here as Private Individual.

Edward H. Harriman, master of the vast Harriman system of railroads across the continent, will slip into Portland as a private individual, meet with the business men of the city of Portland, confer regarding the transportation situation here, and then go on unostentatiously to the east, if he carries out the desires expressed by him.

Some time ago Mr. Harriman was invited to be the guest of honor at a dinner to be given by the Portland Commercial club. In reply, the railroad magnate stated that he did not desire to confer with the business men of the city as a private citizen. He did not desire any show, reception or public function, but stated that he did desire to confer with the business men regarding the general railroad situation. In accordance with this expression no plans for the reception or entertainment of Mr. Harriman have been made by the Commercial club, and none will be. It is very probable that upon his arrival in Portland, which is scheduled for the latter part of this week, he will be taken to the Commercial club by local railroad officials, and there will meet, unofficially, with prominent business men and citizens of Portland.
