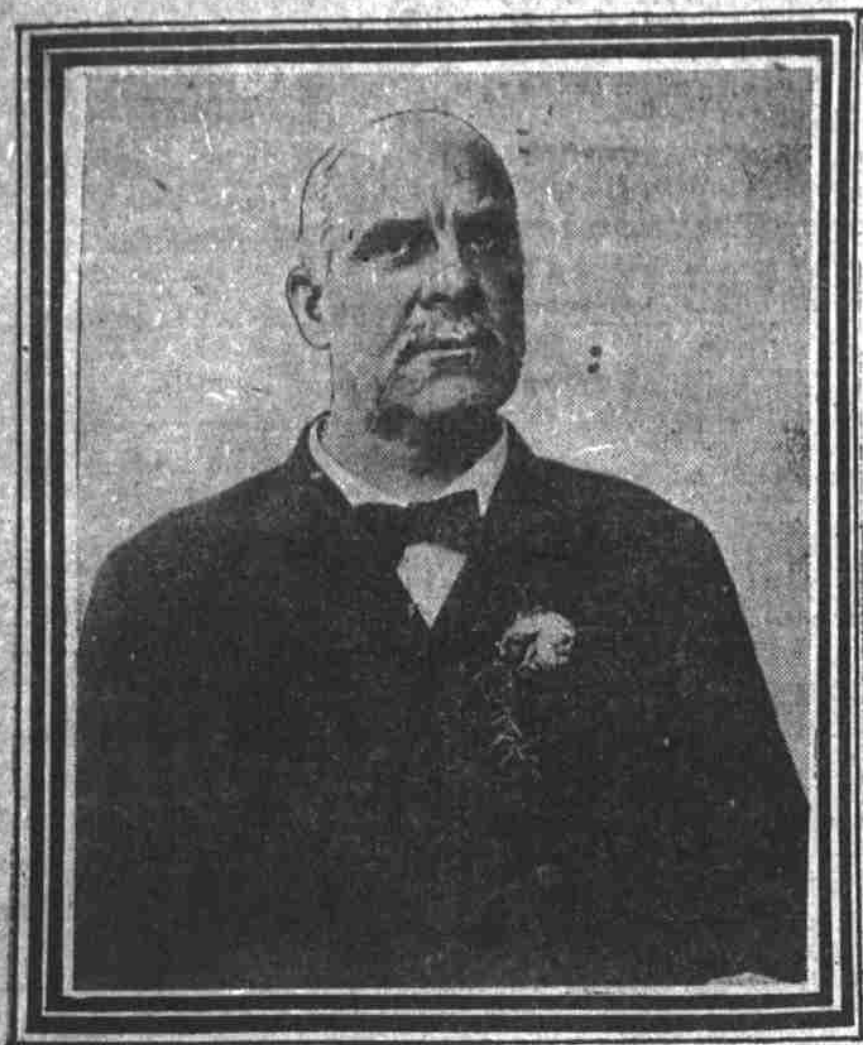


CHAFFIN HERE TO AID PROHIBITION'S CAUSE



Eugene W. Chaffin, Prohibition Candidate for President.

"Of course a man can take a drink and be a Prohibitionist. He can be a drunkard and be a member of the Prohibition party, if he votes the ticket. That is all it takes to be a Prohibitionist. Seventy-five per cent of the voters of the country are Prohibitionists at heart, and my purpose and effort is not to make converts to the party but to get believers in prohibition to vote their belief." In this wise does Eugene W. Chaffin, candidate for president of the United States on the Prohibition ticket, talk of the qualifications for membership in the party and of the aims of the organization.

Mr. Chaffin reached Portland this morning on the North Coast limited and was met by a committee of cold-water men and escorted by automobiles to the Commercial club, where breakfast was served. To this feast 13 people sat down, 11 men and one woman, the lady being the daughter of I. H. Amos, a well-known Prohibition party man in the city. There was no wine served and nothing was to be found in bottles on the table other than olive oil, tomato catsup and carafes of good Bull Run, which, however, brought to none of those present the good old stanzas commencing, "And the clink of the ice in the pitcher tell is just about the sweetest sound of all." None of the guests had a headache, but all of them had appetites and disposed quite comfortably of a light breakfast which included the following dishes: Peaches and cream, Chinook salmon au gratin, ham, corned beef, French lamb chops, broiled bacon, coffee, rolls and toast.

Mr. Chaffin is democratic in bearing, pleasant in address, full of wit and laughter, forceful in his talk and obliging. Following his breakfast he met the representatives of the press in the main dining-room of the club, talked to them freely, and obligingly stood on the balcony, right above the sidewalk, while his picture was being taken for publication. Then he invited the newspapermen to call on him for an hour this evening when he would have more time to talk, and hurried away with his escort to the hotel. Chaffin is waiting below to deliver his principal address of the day at the Taylor street Methodist church this evening, the doors of which will be opened at 7:30.

Candidate Chaffin's Views.

In his discussion this morning of the politics of the nation from a prohibition standpoint Mr. Chaffin took a somewhat different view from that generally accepted as the platform of the prohibitionist. He said that anyone who voted the prohibition ticket was a prohibitionist, no matter whether he took an occasional drink, or was a regular drinker or a drunkard. Candidates for office on the prohibition ticket must be teetotalers, however, he declared.

"What makes a party man, or identifies a voter with any political organization?" asked Mr. Chaffin. "The newspaper men. They before any of them could undertake an answer he told them.

Republican is a man who votes the Republican ticket and believes in the principles of that party, is he not?" the presidential candidate asked. "A member of the Democratic party is one who votes the Democratic ticket and be-

IDAHO RANCHER FOUND SLAIN

William Simmons' Corpse in Barnyard—Killed a Man Two Years Ago.

Boise, Idaho, Sept. 4.—William C. Simmons, who two years ago shot and killed August Stankus during a quarrel over a lost fence, was found dead in the barnyard at his ranch in Highland valley this morning. The body was covered with blood, indicating foul play. The coroner was summoned and no examination of the body was made, pending his arrival. At the time Simmons killed Stankus he wounded Louis Jennings, who was a witness against him at the trial. Simmons was acquitted on the ground of self-defense.

BELL BALKS ON HIS FOES' PLAN

W. K. Hayes Then Accepts Congressional Nomination—State Platform.

Stockton, Cal., Sept. 4.—After seven men had declined the nomination W. K. Hayes of Ohio was finally selected this noon to make the run for congress from the Second district against Congressman McKinlay. The convention of the delegates from this district furnished the real fight of the day. An attempt was made to force the nomination on him was tricky. An impassioned speech the Democratic leader declined. He flayed McNab and his supporters unmercifully and declared that the attempt to force the nomination on him was a trick.

"If McNab and Frank Gould think they can separate me from the Democratic party in California, let them try it all hell freezes over," shouted Bell.

Bell declared he had planned to stump the middle west at the personal invitation of William J. Bryan and that his work was already mapped out for him.

He flayed Hearst and denounced the effort being made to induce him for United States senator, on the ground that his enemies were trying to weaken him by making it appear that that was his sole ambition.

The platform adopted by the Democratic state convention was the result of an all-night fight in the resolutions committee, which continued until 5 o'clock this morning.

The capital plank was the subject of a bitter quarrel. The Alameda county delegation took the stand that the war for the capital is a local war between Berkeley and Sacramento. Theodore A. Bell favored the plank against the removal and made a long speech. As finally adopted it condemns the proposition to remove the capital as "an attempt by the Southern Pacific company to punish the independent voters of Sacramento." Berkeley is not named in the plank.

The suffragettes won their fight. The committee decided unanimously to favor the submission of the equal suffrage amendment to the people.

A plank condemning the intrusion of politics in the affairs of the state university at Berkeley by the discharge of competent men because of their political views was included. This has reference particularly to the discharge of Attorney Snook by the board of regents.

Racetrack gambling is condemned and a strong law abolishing it is recommended. The platform strongly supports Bryan.

BRUTALLY BEAT OLD MAN OUT OF REVENGE

In revenge for his statement that he believed some one employed on the Jonathan Moore ranch on Squaw's island had stolen the goods missing from the Blythe preserve where he is caretaker, W. B. Campbell, aged 60 years, has severely beaten a few days ago by Bert Wieserflou and Edward Anderson, according to the old man's testimony.

Campbell swore to a warrant charging the two men with assault and battery in the justice court yesterday, and Deputy Constable Kierman charged launch Vixen and hurried down the river, armed to the teeth. He found that Anderson and lost no time in taking a boat and making for the Washington shore, but Wieserflou was found and brought back to Portland. He is out of the county jail under bonds. He admits the thrashing, but says it was done because of Campbell's accusations, which he declares to be false.

PROMINENT RAILROAD MEN IN PORTLAND

Joseph McCabe, of Walla Walla, is a guest at the Portland hotel. Mr. McCabe was formerly general manager of the Washington and Columbia River railroad running between Walla Walla and Pendleton, and was one of the well known railroad men of the coast. Standing high in the councils of J. J. Hill, about three years ago he resigned to take charge of a large contract at Providence, R. I., embracing the construction of a tunnel under the city and the arrangement of terminal grounds and tracks for the New York, New Haven & Connecticut railway.

UNION PACIFIC CHANGES ROUTE

The Aberdeen-Chehalis Line Will Swerve to South of Latter City.

Centralia, Wash., Sept. 4.—Developments within the past few days indicate that the Union Pacific has changed its plans as to how its branch line to Aberdeen shall connect with its main line here. At one time it seemed definitely settled that the connection would be made to the north of Centralia, just south of the Martin Lumber company's mill. It is now believed that the connection will be made through the south part of the city, instead of through the north. A party of Union Pacific surveyors is now running a line from the Francis mill on the Chehalis river along the west bank of that stream to the Guerrier shingle mill.

No change of the line is contemplated from the Francis mill westward. That part of the line secures for the Union Pacific the best route to Cosmopolis and the business of all the mills at the mouth of Lincoln creek. The first station west from this city will be between the Lincoln Creek Lumber company's mill and the Francis mill. A definite location between these two points has not been decided upon, but a station anywhere would command the business of all three mills and also that of the Lincoln Creek valley.

Another Line for Harriman.

Des. Or., Sept. 4.—Current rumors that Harriman intends taking over the Mount Hood railway, which connects Hood River with Des., a distance of 17 miles, were further borne out yesterday when Manager J. P. O'Brien of the O. R. & N. made a trip of inspection over the line in his private car.
