SHE DARED TO MEDDLE WITH SACRED ROYALTY

Hence It Is Years in Siberia for Princess Tchernisky and Her Followers, Who Sought by Plain Enlightenment to Emancipate Russia.

(United Press Leased Wire.)
St. Petersburg, Sept. 4.—Convicted of being a member of a revolutionary group organized for the purpose of changing the existing forms of Russian social life, Princess Alexandrovna Tchernisky, a beautiful and accomplished descendant of an ancient royal family and said to be distantly related to Czar Nicholas, was sentenced today with 45 followers to spend a long period of exile and penal servitude in the wastes of Siberia.

The princess and five of her disciples will serve sentences of 15 years each. Ten of the others were sentenced to 12 years; 10 to 10 years; 5 to 8 years; 5 to 6 years; 1 to 5 years and 9 to 2 years. The sect of which Princess Tchernisky was leader did not teach violent revolutionary policies and made no effort to excite the people to armed uprisings against the czar's autocratic rule, but they urged a gradual campaign to undermine the strength of the throne and prepare Russia for a future national emancipation. Their idea was to make the people supreme by a system of universal education.

For a long time the imperial commissioners could not secure sufficient evidence against the reformers to convict them; but the princess was finally thrown into prison and harshly tried. Following her trial, the little group of disciples she had gathered around her were also taken into custody and today were sentenced to go with their leader into exile.

SMALLEST INCREASE IN YEARS IN NUMBER OF SCHOOL CHILDREN

Olympia, Wash., Sept. 4.—Completed school census figures show a total number of children of school age in this state of 247,000. This is an increase for the year of 12,945. The increase is smaller than for several preceding years. When it averaged about 15,000. The enrollment for the entire state this year was 198,514, an increase of

9,225, and the average daily attendance was 142,375, showing an increase over the preceding year of 11,523. The increase in daily attendance is proportionately larger than the increase in enrollment and census and is due to the enforcement of the compulsory school law. The census figures show 6,517 teachers employed, an increase for the year of 308, and a total number of school buildings of 2,883, an increase of 98.
