Rigg, Diamond,
Field and TrackRIFLE SHOTS AT
SEA GIRT RANGEAmbitious Military Marks-
men Will Compete for
Dryden Trophy.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.)

Sea Girt, N. J., Sept. 4.—Of scarcely less importance to the military world than the great national matches recently held at Camp Perry, are those which began on the Sea Girt ranges today and will continue through the whole of next week. In addition to the annual matches of the New Jersey Rifle association, those of the New York State Rifle association and the United States Revolver association are to be held at the same time. The Sea Girt range has always been a Mecca for ambitious marksmen, and this year a program has been arranged which for richness and attractiveness compares favorably with any ever shot.

Many of the teams that recently competed at Camp Perry are here to take part in the various matches. Cuba and the Philippines, in addition to nearly all the states, are represented. For the first time the rifles with which the army and the national guard were recently equipped, together with the new United States ammunition, will be used in contests in this country, and the results will be of importance in determining their value.

The most important match will be for the Dryden trophy, a magnificent piece of bronze, presented by ex-Senator Dryden, of Oregon. The trophy carries with it the championship of the military service eligible to the national trophy match. It is shot at 200, 300 and 400 yards. The trophy carries with it cash prizes of from \$50 to \$150. The interstate regimental trophy for the Briggs trophy, presented by Senator Briggs of New Jersey, will be shot at the same distance by teams of six. With this trophy goes a medal to each man on the winning team, with cash prizes to the second, third and fourth teams.

The matches of the New York State Rifle association are headed by the company team match at 200, 300 and 400 yards, open to teams of four. Another leading event will be the Thurston match, at 300 and 400 yards, open to everybody.

The program of the United States Revolver association comprises four great matches. The first is the championship match, in which the champion carries with it the revolver championship of the United States, together with the championship cup. The second is the silver cup match, in which the champion carries the title of champion, and the fourth is the military revolver record match, with unlimited entries. All of these matches are regarded as very difficult, as they require as many as 50 shots and at 50 yards' distance.

"STUMP" STOTT
COLUMBIA COACHFormer Stanford Captain
Will Handle Reins at
Catholic University.

The faculty board of control at Columbia university last week selected Plowden Stott of this city as coach of the football team for the coming season. Mr. Stott has accepted the appointment and will enter upon the duties of his new position when school opens for the fall term, September 14.

Mr. Stott's previous experience both as a player and coach has eminently fitted him for his present position. During four years as a student at Stanford university he made a mark for himself on the varsity team and played as captain during the season of 1906. He has also played with Multnomah and will captain the club team during the coming season. He showed his ability as coach by his work at East Side High last season. With practically raw material he turned out one of the speediest aggregations that ever played in an intercollegiate series.

His appointment as coach at Columbia has boosted football stock at the university and present indications point to the best year in the athletic history of the school.

Practically all of last year's squad are returning, among them Dean Walker, the big halfback of last year and captain-elect for the coming season; Quinn, Ennis, Aya, Becker, Seuffer, Lane, Dockstader and possibly Pomeroy. Alfred O'Brien has been reelected manager and is at present arranging the fall schedule.
