

MORE ADDED DOZENS OF REPUBLICANS FOR G. J. P.'S

Bourne's Private Secretary to Smear Salve on Oregon Republicans' Factional Fight by Organizing Independent Taft Clubs.

John C. Young, private secretary to Senator Jonathan Bourne, is the official Taft club organizer for Oregon by virtue of appointment of John Hays Hammond, president of the National Taft League.

Word has come to Portland of the appointment of Mr. Young by Mr. Hammond, and the appointee will make arrangements to begin his work at once. The purpose of Mr. Young's work will be to organize those Republicans in the state who desire to get away from the central committee and Taft clubs for the support of Taft and Sherman.

These clubs will be independent of, but auxiliary to, the national state central committee and in their efforts for the ticket will proceed along the same line of policy adopted by the national committee and State Chairman C. E. C. in the official management of the campaign.

Mr. Young will start on a tour of the state in a short time and will organize independent Taft clubs in every county and city under the authority of the National Taft League.

SEND MEMBER TO OMAHA MEETING

At a meeting of the ways and means committee this morning an ordinance was recommended for passage providing for an appropriation of \$300 to send one of the members of the charter revision committee to Omaha to attend the meeting of the League of American Municipalities, September 20 and October 1, and 2 Councilman Rushlight made a minority report recommending that if there is any representation from Portland that two members of the committee be sent, one favoring the commission form of government and the other favoring the present system.

JAP TOWN BURNS; 15,000 HOMELESS

Tokio, Sept. 4.—Fifteen thousand people are homeless as the result of a fire which almost entirely destroyed the city of Niigata, 18 miles east of here, today. It is estimated that 5,000 buildings were destroyed. The town has a population of 40,000. The government has been asked for aid in the reconstruction of the town. Food depots will be opened at once. So far as is known no lives were lost.

S. & S. DEMURRER IS OVERRULED

Frederick Judge Gantenbein in the circuit court this morning overruled the demurrer in the case of J. M. Parks and others against the Zimmerman Packing company and Schwartzschild & Sulzburger, thereby sustaining the right of the plaintiffs to maintain their suit to restrain the operation of the plant within the city limits. The defendants contended that the court had no jurisdiction and that the matter should not be tried. The case will be heard later on its merits. Parks and other residents contending that the odor from the packing plant should be abated.

BUFFALO BILL IS COMING TO PORTLAND

Buffalo Bill and his wild west show will be here September 25 and 26 and Portland will have four performances during the two days. This is the first time in seven years that this show has visited Portland. Colonel William F. Cody, (Buffalo Bill), will be with the show and take part in all the performances.

IMMENSE PARADE IN NEW YORK LABOR DAY

New York, Sept. 4.—The annual parade on arrangements that the labor day parade will be the greatest event of the kind in the history of the country. It is expected that 40,000 men will be in line and particular attention will be given to the arrangements in view of the presidential campaign this fall.

TEXAS KILLS ONE AND SELF

Watson, who was a married man, was walking with Miss Edsal, when he suddenly drew the revolver and fired at Horn, who was near. No motive can be given for the tragedy.

REAL ESTATE AGENT ARRESTED

M. O. Griffin, a well known real estate agent of Portland, was arrested yesterday on a charge of larceny by bailiff, preferred by Anton Hettkemper. Griffin is charged with the larceny of a land deal understood to be the basis of the arrest. Mr. Griffin was released from the custody of the constable on bail.

ANGRY WOMEN CAUGHT STEALING A CHILD, WOODCHOPPER ESCAPES IRATE MOTHERS.

One of the most exciting chases for a child thief which ever stirred the fathers and mothers of Portland to indignation occurred yesterday afternoon in the southern part of the city. It ended in the arrest of John Gleese, a woodchopper 46 years old, who was positively identified as the man who had led little Ida Fendel, 4 years old, from her home at Front and Hill streets.

Gleese was captured because after outrunning his pursuers he ambled along Front street near Curry to watch a fire engine climb the hill in answer to an alarm. He did not see Patrol Driver Gruber with the police vehicle on the other side of the fire apparatus, as the man wanted, and he was at once arrested.

Gleese was bundled into the patrol wagon despite his protestations of innocence, and F. M. Howe, a concrete worker on Corbett street, who had been in the chase but dropped out, overtook the wagon and got in to guard the prisoner. When the foreign colony on South Front street learned that the man who had tried to kidnap the little Fendel was in the wagon in front of the Fendel home, a score of angry women surrounded the wagon in an instant, rival of other officers by the timely arrival of the patrol wagon.

Finally circling back toward the center of the city, he collided with Gruber and the patrol wagon. Officers Evans, Wilson and Rudolph had been in pursuit over an hour. Before the police were near enough to stop him, Gleese had forced his pursuers to pause by throwing rocks straight at the crowd at his heels.

Two hearings and two depositions are alleged to have taken place in this short space of time, in a complaint for divorce filed in the circuit court.

REFUSE PERMIT TO TRIM TREES

At a meeting of the park board this morning a blanket permit was denied the Pacific Telephone company to trim trees which interfere with the company's wires. Park Keeper Mische reported against the blanket permit and the board adopted his report, at the same time instructing the company that if it wants to trim any trees to first get the permission of the park keeper.

STOPPED ENGINE WITHIN 3 FEET OF MAN'S BODY

Thrown from the top of a high boxcar by a sudden jolt, C. B. Almsco, a Terminal company brakeman living at 98 Knott street, lay unconscious on the rails with another train bearing down upon him. The second engine was stopped with the cow-catcher within three feet of the brakeman's body.

IRRITATED WIFE COOLS OFF QUICKLY

When she sought a warrant for the arrest of her husband, Mrs. Borden declared she would be glad to see him working on the rockpile. When Borden was arrested she became somewhat cooler. Today she charged the assault and battery preferred by her against Borden was dropped in the municipal court. The court assessed the costs, \$5, and dismissed.

SPECIAL CAR FOR BRYAN TOUR EAST

Chicago, Sept. 4.—Arrangements were completed by the national committee today for a private car to be used by Bryan on his eastern tour. It will leave Peoria for the east on September 10. Other speakers and newspaper reporters will accompany the candidate.

CONGRESSMAN JONES WARMLY RECEIVED

Vancouver, Wash., Sept. 4.—Congressman Wesley L. Jones, a candidate for United States senator to succeed Levi Almsky, spoke in the Auditorium here today before an audience of 1,000. His speech, setting forth mainly what he would do if elected to the senate, was well received.

DATES OF R. & N. RAILROAD'S TIME BEGINS

At Wasco and Pendleton, September 22 and 28, on Grain Schedules.

(United Press Lapsed Wire.) Salem, Or., Sept. 4.—Satisfied that the rates and charges exacted by the O. R. & N. on grain are unreasonable and discriminatory as compared with the charges on other railroads in Oregon, the railroad commission today set September 22 at Wasco and September 28 at Pendleton as dates for hearings at which the railroad company will be required to show cause why its rates should not be readjusted.

FIRST TRAIN OVER ELECTRIC

Hillsboro, Or., Sept. 4.—Tracklaying on the electric line was connected yesterday evening at the east side of town with the track laid early in the summer and the construction train made its first run into the city. It is expected that cars will be in operation in a few days. The track wires are up some distance this side of Beaverton.

PEACHES WITH WRONG KIND OF SWEETENING

Bleeding from a cut lip, H. Brethaupt, a farmer who came to the city with a load of peaches, complained to the police this afternoon that about 1 o'clock he ran across Grand avenue to board a Brooklyn car. When the car stopped at the intersection of Grand and 15th, called him an old fool for running in front of the car. After an exchange of words, the conductor, so the farmer declares, stepped to the street and struck him heavily.

GRESHAM WANTS JUSTICE OF PEACE

J. S. Hudson of Troutdale, justice of the peace for the Multnomah district, has sent a letter of resignation to the county court. He says he will soon remove from the county. The Gresham people are pulling for the appointment of Hudson's successor from that town, claiming that this would be for the greater convenience of the people to be accommodated. D. S. Johnson of Gresham, who formerly held the office, is being favorably mentioned.
