A conference was held yesterday afternoon in the office of President D. S. Josselyn of the Portland Railway, Light & Power company for the purpose of considering what can be done in the way of complying with the demands of the underwriters in relation to the power of current delivered into buildings for the service of motors used for running machinery. Among those present was Professor C. L. Cory of the University of California, who is consulting electrical engineer of the Pacific Coast Board of Underwriters. After the conference, Cory stated that the company is willing to remedy whatever fault there is on its part, but that this will take some months to two years to require from months to two years to change a direct current with ground circuit to insulated return circuit. The company is putting its wires underground as rapidly as possible.

No action was taken by the school board yesterday afternoon at a special meeting to determine the board's attitude in regard to the court order instructing the board to make public the report of Architect Somerville, who passed on the competitive designs submitted for the new high school building in Albina. The members present refused to do anything in the matter because of the absence of Chairman Wittenberg. The United States civil service commission announces the postponement to October 7 and 8, 1908, of the examination scheduled to be held on September 3 and 4, 1908, to secure eligibles from which to make certifications for the appointment of examiners in the division of accounts, interstate commerce commission. The salaries will range from \$1,800 to \$3,000 per annum, and traveling expenses will be allowed when away from Washington or other office headquarters. It is expected that approximately 75 appointments will be made if sufficient high-grade eligibles result from this examination.

MURPHY GIVEN FEW DAYS MORE

Discharged Patrolman's Final Hearing Continued Till September 17.

Ex-Patrolman Murphy, discharged by the executive committee of the city council for drunkenness and conduct unbecoming an officer, will have 12 more days to brood over his troubles before the final word is said by the civil service committee, to which body the officer appealed his case. When the case was called before the commission this morning, Attorney Murphy, who is appearing for the accused, immediately asked a continuance on the grounds that M. P. Sloan and W. E. Robson, two officers who would appear in behalf of the defendant, were absent from the city on their vacations. He started to read the motion, but Deputy City Attorney Tomlinson handed him off with: "Inasmuch as this motion reflects on the character of the witnesses for the prosecution, I request that copies be given to the commission so the members can peruse them at their own leisure. I have no objection to a continuance." The commission took Tomlinson's advice, quashed a verbal recitation of the motion and set the hearing for September 17 at 10 o'clock. Attorney Murphy then raised the question whether the city attorney as prosecutor for the city was competent to prosecute a city employee, holding that instead he should appear in the defendant's behalf. The question will be thrashed out and decision reached before the commission meets again.

CAN FIND NO TRACE OF MISSING CLERK

No trace has been found of Abe Chapman, a young man employed at the New York Outfitting company who disappeared about two weeks ago. The day he disappeared he drew his money out of the bank but left practically all of his clothing behind, among other possessions, his new \$35 overcoat. A mining man, William Barrigan, is said to have been intimate with Chapman, and if this man could be located it is thought he might be able to throw some light on the movements of his friend. Chapman's brother, said to be a wealthy resident of New York, has been notified.
