There is no need for adroit thrusts or leaders' skill. If all that Bryan has favored during the past 12 years had been enacted into law, the country would have been overwhelmed with disaster and would regard it as his chief business in the future to find a way of escape from the members of the considered legislation. Bryan says the Democratic platform is binding as to what it omits as well as what it contains.

He might have added it is just as significant in one case as in the other. considered campaign issues. Bryan desires that United States senators be chosen by direct vote. Taft also inclines to favor this course. This can be accomplished by a constitutional amendment and as long as there are 13 states which do not desire the amendment, no constitutional provision for the election by the legislators can not be changed.

The Atlantic high pressure area has decreased in energy and remained nearly stationary. Small disturbances in the central north of Minnesota and the barometer continues relatively low over California and Arizona. No rain or snow comment. Local rains are reported in the east gulf and south Atlantic states, and fair weather prevails generally in the lake region, middle Atlantic, and New England states. The temperatures continue slightly above normal on the Pacific slope. It is warmer in the western portion of the Dakotas, and in the lower part of middle Atlantic, and New England states.
