

RAILS AND IRRIGATION ARE FAST DEVELOPING KLAMATH

SAN FRANCISCO BUYS FLOUR REJECTED BY CHINA

About 5,625 Barrels Brought Over From Orient and Sell Very Low.

San Francisco, Sept. 5.—The receipts of flour were 7,037 barrels, including 5,625 barrels from China, per steamer Mongolia. The latter had been shipped from the northwest, was of poor quality and was rejected on arriving at its destination. Purchasers were found here for it at low prices, and it will be used for a special purpose.

During last week the spot wheat market was inactive, and nominally unchanged prices. Buyers and sellers were apart in their views, otherwise there might have been a moderate trade. Today's receipts were 122 cents.

Spot barley remained unchanged and steady, with a quiet market. December closed weaker. The local receipts were 4,495 centals, and at Port Costa the large quantity of 85,200 sacks was received. A cargo was in the stream awaiting clearance for the United Kingdom.

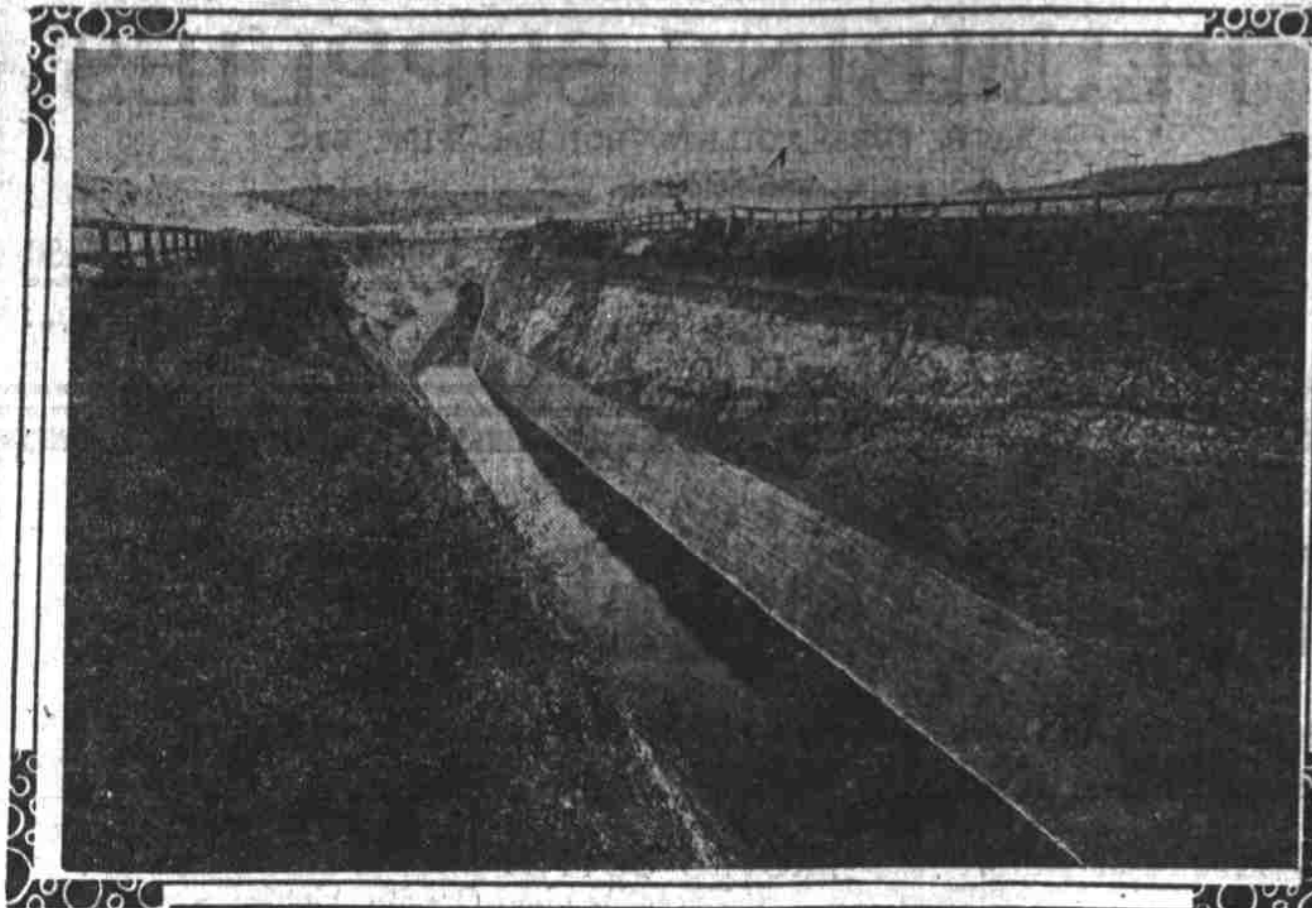
Oats were very firmly held, on light receipts and in sympathy with the northern markets, which recently advanced. Today's receipts were 310 centals, including 420 centals from Oregon. There was a somewhat easy tone to the potato market. The receipts of onions having fallen off considerably of late, prices were firmer. Tomatoes have been extremely weak and dragging, but as two canneries will start on them in the coming week, the surplus stock promises to be well provided for. String beans were more plentiful and weaker. Other articles generally ruled at weak prices.

California fresh extra butter was advanced 1 cent per pound, 26 cents being bid on change, without any offering at that price. The market was firm for all descriptions. There was some activity in eggs, and fresh extras were marked up 4 cent per dozen. Cheese was without any price changes. California flats being steady and Young America weak.

Pears were one of the leading features of the market during the past few days. For a time they poured into this market at an astonishing rate from all the producing sections. The market became so glutted with them that for a considerable time there were no settled prices, and very large quantities had decayed were sent to the crematorium as the only means of disposal.

Figs were plentiful and going slowly at weak prices. Melons are in abundance. Choice grapes were in fairly good demand. There was quite a supply of muscats in large boxes from the river and Marysville. In the coming week wine grapes will probably figure to some extent in the market. Ordinary peaches were weak, the best prices being obtained for strawberry free. Salways were quoted at 2 1/2 per ton for canning, and cing at \$2.75.

Pelican Bay is about one third way between Klamath Falls and Crater Lake. In his address before the Klamath Falls chamber of commerce on August 13, Mr. Harriman said: "We expect the railroad to be completed in the early autumn of this year to Teter's Landing, 17 miles from Klamath Falls. This will give you rapid water communications at that early date. We expect to have trains in operation to Klamath Falls in the early part of the year 1909."

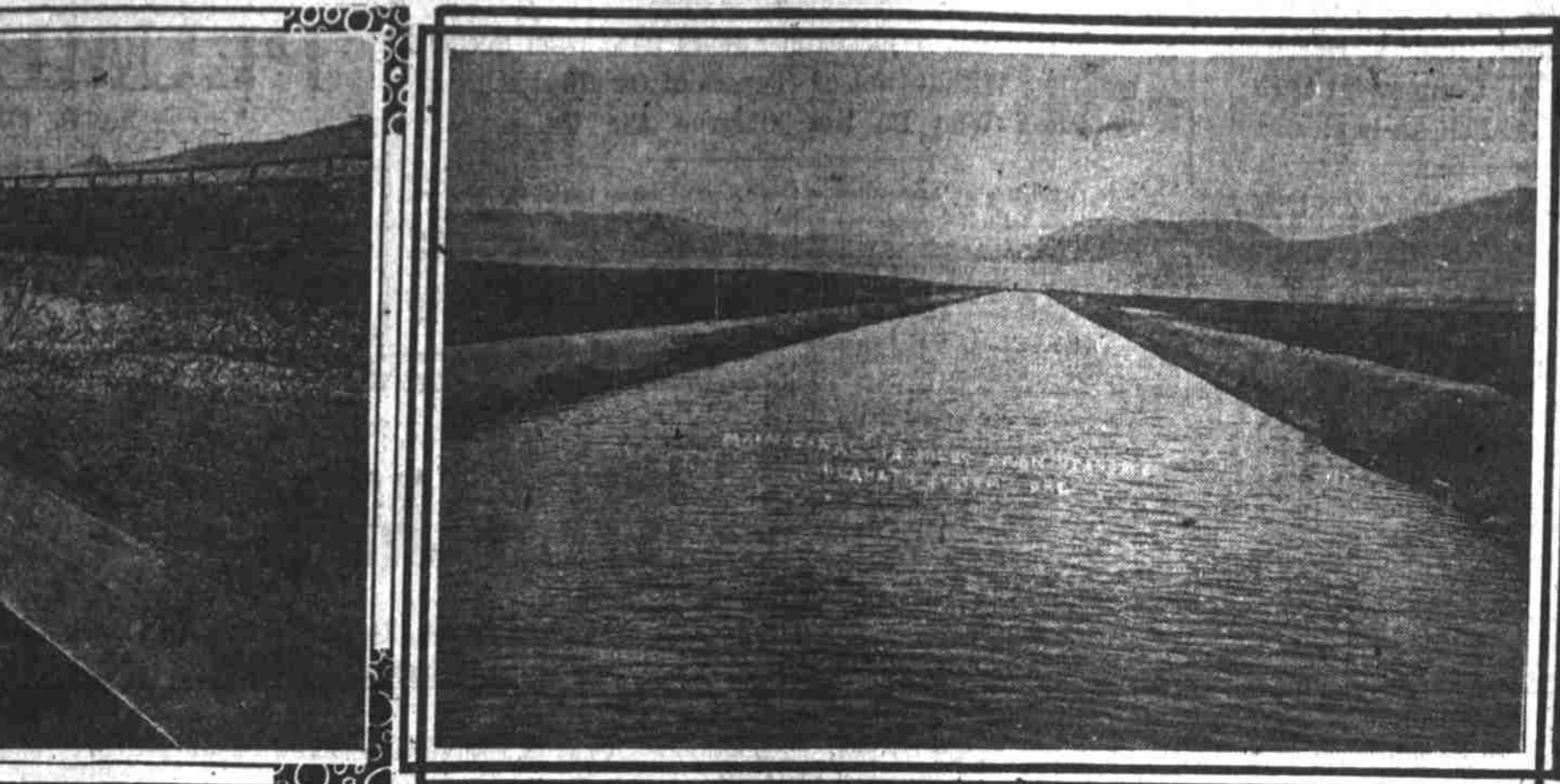


View of Canal Where It Emerges From Tunnel Near Klamath Falls.

Klamath Falls and that large, rich section known as "the Klamath country," has occupied more than usual space in the newspapers for the last few weeks because of the visit of E. H. Harriman and party to Pelican Bay, occupied with the news that there is soon to be a railroad through central Oregon that will open up a vast undeveloped territory. The pictures herewith illustrate another phase of Klamath development—the immense undertaking of the United States reclamation service.

These pictures, furnished by F. J. Steinmetz and M. L. Allison of Portland, show some of the work that has been done on the lower Klamath project, including the big dam and scenes on the big canals. The reclamation workers have just started in earnest on the upper, or Clear lake project. Teams were started from Klamath Falls for the new reservoir site a few days ago, and deliveries of 100 tons of freight are to be made before December 1. The turn of farmers in the upper country has now come to reap profits from advance in the value of their holdings through the work of irrigation.

The coming of the railroad and the advancement of the government irrigation plans are the things that Klamath has lacked. Now these are at hand and Klamath will come into her own. Large holdings will be divided, there will be a rush of new settlers, and Klamath will become better known to the world, with an outlet for its products and an inlet for the tide of irrigation and pleasure travel.



Main Canal 12 Miles From the Headgates.

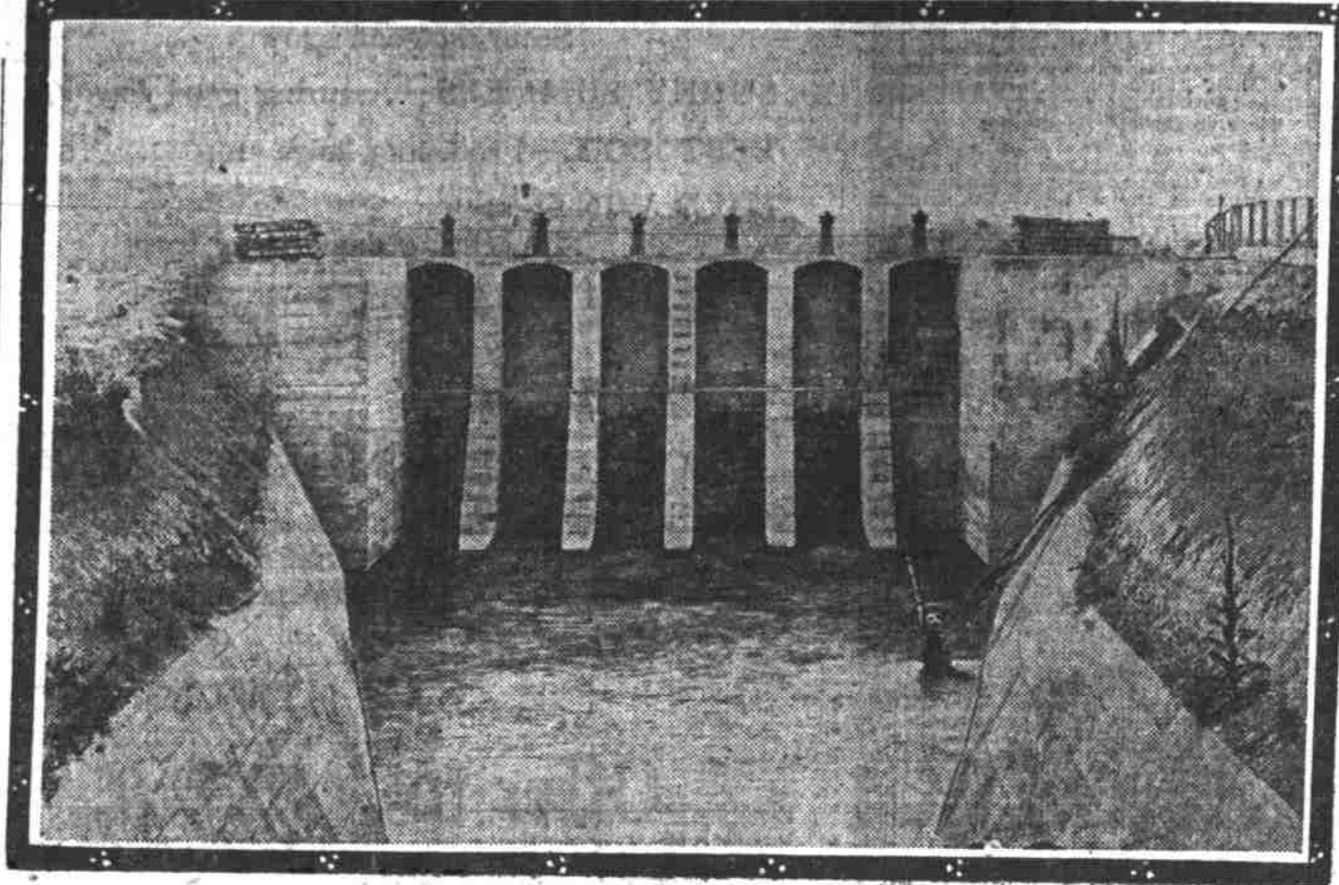
can be done. Drainage is a vitally necessary adjunct of reclamation work, and in the Klamath project nearly one half of the area to be reclaimed is now under water to a depth of from one to 15 feet. The land open to purchase of homesteaders is under the remaining portion and includes some of the choicest farming land of the basin.

There is no public land under the project open to homestead entry at the present time and will not be for several years, but choice of large acreage can be bought at from \$20 to \$40 per acre. The land to be reclaimed lies in Klamath county, Or., and in Modoc and Siskiyou counties, Cal., but it is essentially an Oregon project.

Start Experiment Farm. The reclamation service has established in connection with the Klamath project an experimental farm, which has been placed in charge of soil experts, who from time to time issue bulletins, giving the results to the farmers. The latest bulletin was one on field and stock pea culture which exhibited great results from a small tract during the present season.

At Sacramento, September 3-7, 1907, in an inter-state exhibit of irrigated products, Klamath county won the Senator Perkins trophy for the best exhibit of forage plants. It also won a \$1,000 Holstein bull for best exhibit from a single irrigated farm, and first prizes for the best exhibit from a single grower of sheep, wheat, sheep barley, and sheep oats.
