

WAS WOMAN MURDERESS?

Omaha, Neb., Sept. 5.—That Dr. Fred K. Rustin came to his death at the hands of a woman is the latest theory of the detectives. With Leona Bullen, the woman with him that night, admitted by an alibi, the police are at work to find the other woman who might be connected with the case.

The whereabouts of Rustin during the three hours from midnight to five o'clock in the morning has not been ascertained. Rumors that Rustin spent that time with another woman have not as yet been substantiated. That he had other women friends is not questioned.

Miss Dineen, a domestic employed in the home of the woman who left Rustin alone with her dying husband several minutes and went to call his mother, a few blocks away, Mrs. Rustin told the girl she could not raise Rustin's home by telephone. When the girl returned the first doctor was on the scene.

The Dineen woman said: "I did not hear the shot. The first I knew of the shooting was when Mrs. Rustin led me, saying Dr. Rustin had been shot. I dressed rapidly and ran down stairs and found Mrs. Rustin on the side of the bed lying on the floor. Rustin was lying on the floor. Mrs. Rustin said she found him on the porch."

"She told me to call 'mother,' meaning Dr. Rustin's mother. I had to go a few blocks, and when I returned the doctor was dead."

The funeral of Rustin was held this afternoon. An Episcopal minister preached a sermon in eulogy of Rustin, saying a man should not be blamed for one bad act in his life, but should be judged by his whole life. Mrs. Rustin attended her husband's funeral with the little girls and her mother-in-law. She is said to be prostrated tonight.

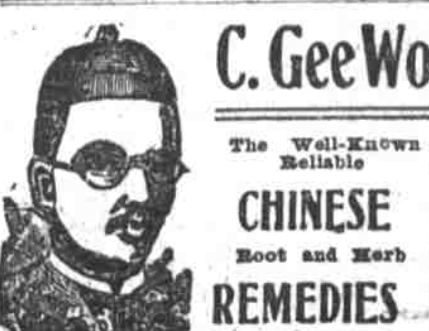
One peculiar feature of the case is that neither the police, county attorney, nor friends in eulogy of Rustin, offering a reward for the murderer, though the suicide theory has been abandoned for two days.

Detectives on the case say there is no question of its being murder, but will not wait until the inquest, next Tuesday morning.

WIRELESS MESSAGES MAY FLY FAR NORTH

Washington, Sept. 5.—Link by link a wonderful chain of wireless stations is being forged in Alaska by the United States signal service. News received today says Fort Gibbon clearly caught a message from Fairbanks, 140 miles away. Circle City, 160 miles further on, is now being tried.

These operations mark the early culmination of what army officers declare to be one of the most difficult engineering and wireless feats ever attempted. When completed the wireless stations, in conjunction with the Alaskan cables, will permit easy communications from Fairbanks to Seward, to Safety, near Nome, a distance of 2,600 miles.

HAINES' SHIPPERS ENTER COMPLAINT
