## NEW BRIDGE TO BE BUILT AT MADISON

No Change in Site of \$450,000 Structure Which Will Span River—Council Vote Is Unanimous Despite Petitioners' Protest.

County Commissioner Lightner Says Present Bridge Is Daily Menace to Thousands of Lives—Structure Absolutely Unsafe.

By the unanimous vote of the 14 councilmen present this morning the ordinance authorizing the sale of \$450,000 worth of bonds for the Madison street bridge was passed despite the fact that 5,135 voters have petitioned to change the location of the bridge from Madison street to Clay and Mill streets.

Repairs which have been made on the bridge have become so expensive that the commission recently sent a bill of \$1,000 to the O. W. P. Co., as its share of the cost which the commission thinks the company should bear.

Urgent Need of New Bridge. Baker stated that the Madison street bridge had been voted for by the people, and that because of the condition of the present bridge the new one should be constructed at once.

## NO POWER TO PUT S. P. OFF FOURTH

Mayor in Message to Council Shows Body How It Labors Under Misapprehension Regarding Railroad Nuisance.

Must Repeal Old Franchise, Which Mayor Declares is Void Anyway, Then Grant New Before Operations Will Cease.

In transmitting the report of the state railroad commission respecting the collision of a Southern Pacific engine and a Fifth street car, Mayor Lane urged the members of the city council to repeal the franchise of the Southern Pacific company and pass a new ordinance which will compel the company to operate its line in a manner more nearly in harmony with the interests and safety of the people.

Mayor Lane stated in his communication that the council has no power to compel the railway company to cease the use of the street by the ordinance which was passed in May 1907.

Points Out Danger. "I submit herewith the copy of a report of the honorable board of railroad commissioners of the state of Oregon in the matter of the collision between an engine of the Southern Pacific Railway company and a streetcar of the Portland Railway, Light & Power company."

## JONES FOR SENATOR IN WASHINGTON

Incomplete Returns Show Congressman Jones Has an Immense Lead Over Ankeny—Only a Heavy City Vote Can Affect It.

Cosgrove, for Governor, Is Thousands Ahead of Mead, With McBride Probably Third—Other Candidates Are Simply Nowhere.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Seattle, Wash., Sept. 9.—Returns received from various sections of the state at 11 o'clock this morning indicate that Wesley L. Jones is the choice of the people for United States senator, his lead over Senator Ankeny being one of a wide range.

Ankeny's Majority in Home County. Walla Walla, Wash., Sept. 9.—From the incomplete returns which have been received up to the present time, it looks as if Ankeny would carry his home county by a plurality of 1,800. Of the 2,000 votes cast Jones will get about 400. Up to the present time the vote is: Ankeny, 1,582; Jones, 846. In this city Ankeny received 1,175 votes, Jones 301.
