

# LUCILE LOST WITH CARGO OF SALMON

### American Ship Meets Doom on Shore of Bristol Bay.

### PASSENGERS AND CREW ARE SAFE

### Vessel Goes Aground Shortly After Leaving Nushagak for San Francisco in Much the Same Manner as the Ship St. Paul Was Lost.

The American ship Lucile, bound from Nushagak to San Francisco with a cargo of canned salmon and fishing equipment, became a total loss August 19, when she ran aground at Cape Menchikof near the mouth of Ugaahik river. The crew and fishermen making the trip south were saved. She carried about 40,000 cases of salmon.

News of the wreck was received here this morning in a telegram to the merchants' exchange from San Francisco, where it was reported by other vessels returning from the Bristol Bay canneries, and that had passed the vicinity of the wreck. Whether the crew and fishermen were left on shore or taken on board one of the other vessels is not made clear at this time.

The Lucile was one of the vessels that went north last spring for the canneries operated by San Francisco parties and she was one of the fleet bringing the season's pack to the Golden Gate. The wreck of the Lucile, across only a few miles from Nushagak, across the bay on the Alaska peninsula. Evidently her master must have lost his bearings in a fog in working out of the bay into Bristol bay.

The Lucile was an old craft, having been built in Freeport, Maine, 1874. She was one of the smallest ships in the salmon fleet this year, her net register being 1,237 tons.

Last season the American ship St. Paul went aground in the same vicinity in working out of the bay, with the result that the vessel and most of the cargo were lost. The St. Paul was bringing out the pack of the Alaska Packers' association, a company of cannery men from Astoria, and was bound for that port when she met her fate. The fishermen and crew remained with the Indians until finally rescued by the ship sent north for them. Superintendent Berglund, who went north for the company this year, reports that the vessel was wrecked on the ship Henry Villard, which reached Astoria August 23 in command of Captain Davidson.

One of the Bristol Bay fleet reached Astoria this morning. She is the American ship Berlin, which sailed from here early in the spring. The Berlin brings the pack of the Warren Packing company of this city and their employees, numbering a couple of hundred Chinese and Japanese.

### MANY CRAFT OVERDUE

No Word Has Yet Been Received From Missing Steamer Aeon.

Somewhat or other there is a larger number of vessels overdue to arrive than for a long time. On the list are both steam and sail tonnage, many of the vessels being well known here. One in which Portland people are, perhaps, most deeply interested is the British steamer Aeon, which left here July 1 for Australia with a cargo of lumber. She called at San Francisco July 6 for mail and a few passengers and has since not been heard from.

It now appears quite probable that the Aeon either went down on the coast of the South Pacific and that possibly her officers, crew and passengers are living a sort of a Robinson Crusoe life on one or more of the little specks of land in the big sea far from the path of ships.
