

FIRED SHOT AT DREYFUSISM

Louis Gregori Says He Had Nothing Against Dreyfus Himself.

ISSUE TITLE IS FULTON OR CAKE?

having been filed on by Emma L. Watson under the assumed name of Emma Porter, and the southeast quarter by Maud Witt, one of Puter and McKinley's "dummies." Suits to cancel all the patents to the fraudulent homestead entries in township 11-1 are now pending in the federal court, and the action of the land commissioner seems inexplicable, considering all features of the situation.

IGNORES FRAUDULENT CHARACTER

It has been a time honored rule of the land department that a lieu selection of any character 11-1 are now pending upon its own basis and where there is any question concerning the validity of title to the base the selection itself must either be amended or else canceled. A temporary suspension of the selection was ordered by the commissioner only after it became apparent that it was included within indemnity limits of the Northern Pacific Railway company, and Fred A. Krebs, the selector, was asked to elect whether he would hold the tract selected and take chances on its interference with the rights of the Northern Pacific, or whether he was willing to relinquish and make selection of other lands in lieu of the bogus 11-1 claims.

COMMISSIONER INQUIRES

United States District Attorney John McCourt, when asked today about the matter, stated that he had not heard that new patents had been issued, and expressed some surprise at the news, although he said he had been informed some days ago that there was a possibility that the patents issued, but he had not thought it probable that they would, as he received a letter from the department only a few days ago asking the status of the contents of the previous patents.

Just what steps will be taken in the matter he has not yet decided, other than that he said he would at once try to ascertain whether or not the patents have been issued, and if possible have them withheld.

"I am surprised to hear," said Mr. McCourt, "that new patents have been issued on the Maud Witt and Emma Porter filings. Patents on these were issued several years ago, but suits have been instituted to have them both set aside and I don't see why new patents should be issued until the matter has been decided. I have never been able to get the matter to trial yet. If new patents are issued I am afraid it will be a difficult matter to contest them, as they will be issued to an innocent purchaser. But I will see at once what can be done."

At this same Saturday meeting another result of the visit of the dove was the decision upon motion of R. E. Williams, that Mr. Cakes should appoint the state secretary to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Otis Patterson of The Dalles, a Fulton man. It is now announced, though not by Chairman Cakes, that C. N. McArthur, a Fulton man, is Mr. Patterson's successor.

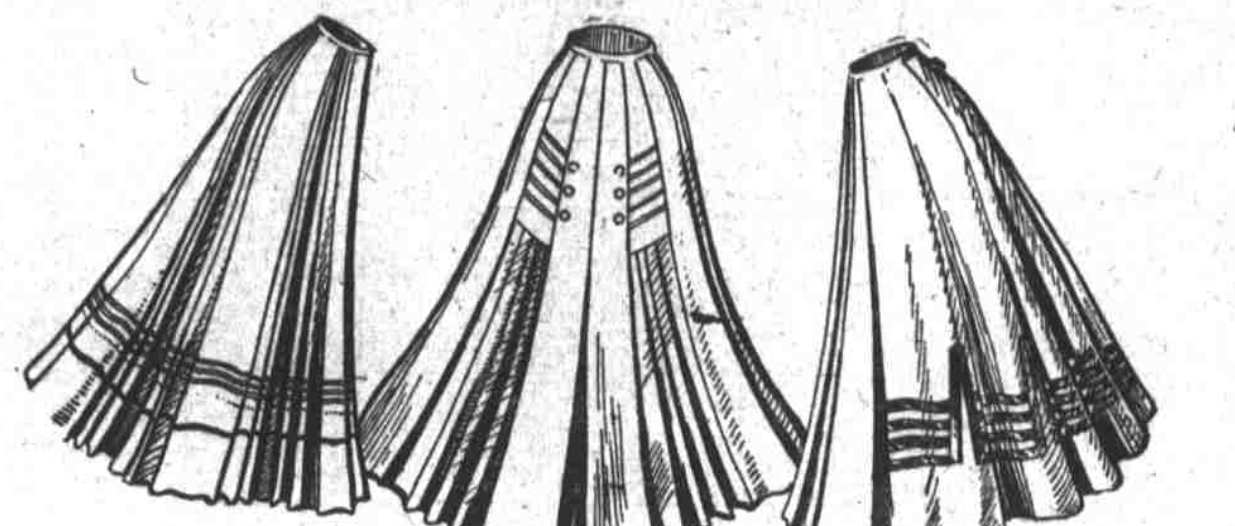
