SAILS IN VAIN IN SEARCH OF CARGO

French Bark Cornifil Bart Returns From New Caledonia.

LEFT IN BALLAST FIVE MONTHS AGO

Windjammer Covers 12,000 Miles and Ends at Starting Point With Charter to Load Grain for Europe—French Bark Le Pelier Arrives.

After an absence of five months the French bark Cornifil Bart returned this morning to Portland under charter to load wheat for Europe. She left here in April for New Caledonia and brought

the same ballast back with her. In the meantime she covered about 12,000 miles for each of which the French government will pay bounty. This is the only case on record, it is believed, where a vessel has sailed away from a port so distant in search of business and returned with the same ballast and in a striking illustration of the method in vogue under the French flag since the bounty law was established. It is said that the Cornifil Bart earned some money for her owners on the trip, even though she did not carry a cargo. The French bark Cornifil Bart returned this morning from New Caledonia and more than twice as long to work back. He declares the weather on the return trip was entirely too fine, nothing but light and baffling breezes with a bright sun and lazy sea. The voyage became decidedly monotonous. During the 90 days at sea not a sail nor cloud of smoke was sighted. Numerous islands were passed in the south sea, but no stop was made. At New Caledonia it rained constantly during the eight days the vessel was in port. The Cornifil Bart is under charter to Balfour, Guthrie & Co. and will begin loading in a few days. She is at anchor at Linton for the time being. She was sent away from here last spring in search of business, when charter rates from this coast took a drop, in the meantime the market improved and she was ordered back again. The French bark Le Pelier, another well-known grain carrier, reached Columbia river this morning from Hobart town, Tasmania. Le Pelier is also under charter to load wheat for Europe.

DEPART WITH GRAIN.

British Steamer Strathlyon Carries Barley to Scotch Port.

The British steamer Strathlyon cleared yesterday afternoon for Leith, Scotland, with a cargo of 37,373 bushels of wheat and 224,135 bushels of barley, valued at \$1,850. The steamer left down last night. This is the second large steamer cargo of grain set afloat here this month, the British steamer Braemar having departed a few days ago with a cargo of wheat for Europe. The French bark Eugene Paulier sailed a few days ago with a cargo of wheat for Europe, being the first sailing vessel to clear during the month. With several steamers and a dozen or so of sailing vessels here to load and a good deal of wheat coming in from the interior warehouses, September bids fair to roll up a fine wheat exporting record, possibly the best in the history of the port.

PORTLAND AND COOS BAY.

Steamer Alliance Arrives and the Breakwater Takes Departure. With 45 passengers and a couple of hundred tons of freight, the steamer Alliance, Captain Olson, arrived here last night. The voyage both down and back was unusually pleasant, fine weather prevailing the entire time. Among the freight were several pieces of furniture for Governor George W. Chamberlain that he secured on his visit to the bay a few weeks ago. The furniture was manufactured on the bay from native woods and highly finished. The steamer Breakwater left Oak street dock last night for Coos Bay with a good load of passengers and several hundred tons of freight. At this time of the year, the balance of trade between Portland and Coos Bay is in favor of Portland, and south bound freights are consequently heavier than northbound.

LARGE FREIGHTER ARRIVES.

British Steamer Sueric Will Load Lumber for Manila. The British steamer Sueric of the Frank Waterhouse Australian line arrived at Astoria this morning and will be at St. Johns mill this evening to take on a shipment of lumber for Manila. She is here from Puget sound, where she took on part cargo and will finish loading at San Francisco. The Sueric is the largest freighter to call here for some time, her net register being over 4,000 tons. She has a dead weight carrying capacity of about 8,000 tons. The Sueric of the same line, which arrived in the Columbia Monday, went to Knappton to load lumber for Australia. She will take about 1,500,000 feet.

ALONG THE WATERFRONT.

The steamer Rosnoko, Captain Dunham, sails this evening for San Pedro via San Francisco and Eureka. Frank Montgomery, assistant weather bureau observer, left this morning for Albany, Orasco, Black Butte, and Brain to inspect the stations there. Captain W. E. Inman of the steamer T. J. Potter in a letter to Government Inspectors Edwards and Fuller stated that the charges against Captain Charles Spencer accusing him of having run his steamer too close to the Potter August 26 when the steamers were bound up the river from Astoria, are exaggerated and that to him it appeared unavoidable to come quite close. In view of this fact the matter will, in all probability, be dropped. R. F. Barnes, deputy collector of customs, will tomorrow afternoon at 2 o'clock sell at auction a number of articles seized by the customs authorities, including opium, some chinaware and furniture. The sale will take place at the custom house. Ladies, it's 450 Washington.

ONE MORE PATROL BOAT.

Fish Warden Charters Launch Eva to Ply Upper River. Fish Warden McAllister today added another craft to his patrol system on the Columbia river by chartering the gasoline boat Eva, Captain Amos. The Eva is one of the staunchest and swiftest launches on the river and will prove a fine acquisition to the fleet of patrol boats. Besides, Captain Amos is acquainted with every nook and corner on the entire Columbia. It is understood that the Eva will be placed in commission on the upper Columbia above the Cascades. On the lower river will be the speedy launch Rose City and a couple of others the names of which have not yet been made public. Portland will be the headquarters of one patrol boat.

Fenwick also cleared for San Pedro with 2,000,000 feet of lumber. Both vessels were loaded by the Tongue Point Lumber company's mill.
