

SOON CLAIM BIG PRIZES

Journal's Contest for Scholarships and Cash Prizes Closes Next Saturday—Some Changes Expected in Standing.

In the last score in The Journal's third annual scholarship contest, Freda Launer, Dallas, leads in the whole field, showing 3,075 votes more than Ralph Robnett, the former leader. Miss Launer added the large number of 27,380 to her previous score, which holds the record in the contest. Vernice Gilkey, Grants Pass, added 6,980, and Beulah Gilkey, Corvallis, came third with 6,115 and went up one place in district No. 1.

JAPANESE PURCHASE 1,000 ACRES IN WASCO
