

# RAGS TO CHEW AT G.O.P. CONVENTION

### State Meet Likely to Be as Harmonious as Dog and Cat Tea Party.

Beware of the Idea of September! Very probably no aged seer, Roman or Republican, has whispered the oracular warning into the ears of J. Caesar Young, secretary to Senator Jonathan Bourne and official organizer of Taft Clubs for Oregon by virtue of appointment by John Hays Hammond, but if he has not then it is because the seer is not very close on the job. The Idea of September held was for Mr. Young, if there is any confidence to be placed in the oracular mouthings of that political witch, Dame Rumor.

September 15 is the date set by Mr. Young for a state convention of Republican clubs to be held in Portland. Mr. Young has issued a call for such a convention, which is to be under the general plan mapped out for the organization of Oregon in an endless chain of Taft clubs under the scheme of the National Taft League. Mr. Young has been appointed official state organizer and is now at work planting clubs in every hamlet and at every cross roads. He is to be joined in his task by Senator Jonathan Bourne, who is expected to reach Portland tomorrow or the next day, for an extended stay, the first visit since his election to the senate two years ago.

One Jonathan Comes. There is existent, as has been noted in the past, some little difference of political opinion between Senator Charles W. Fulton, Senator Bourne and their respective factional adherents, henchmen and lieutenants. What pleases Senator Fulton does not please Senator Bourne and what Senator Bourne attempts to do is blocked at each turn, if possible, by the zealous adherents of the Fulton cause.

Some few months ago Senator Bourne wanted to lead the state delegation back to the national convention at Chicago. What happened at that convention, and afterward, is very recent political history. Senator Bourne is coming home to take large part in the organization of the state for Taft through the medium of Taft clubs, the influence of which will be considerable. Already the rumble of strife has begun to fill the air. Up at Salem last night the two Republican clubs voiced in no uncertain terms their disapproval of Mr. Bourne's and Mr. Young's activity by roasting both of them, refusing to take the name suggested by Mr. Young but at the same time electing a delegation to attend the state convention in Portland September 15.

From other parts of the state the same grumbling sound is beginning to be heard. Different clubs do not like the new scheme, at least under its new management. These clubs are all electing delegates to attend the state convention. What, then, will probably happen?

Signs of Fireworks. Having issued the call for the convention it would be reasonable to expect that other Manager J. C. Young or some trusted lieutenant of his, would call the convention to order, state its objects and proceed to the permanent organization. Since Mr. Young is the official head of the movement it is also reasonable to expect that he will either desire to be made the permanent head of the permanent organization, or else that some one close to him and in harmony with his plans and desires be given the leading place. Along there some place the fireworks are expected to begin. Unless the signs fail, there will be a
