MAINE TO CAST
VOTE TODAY
Democrats Hope for Great Gains, at Least—Prohibition the Issue.
(Special Dispatch to The Journal.)
New York, Sept. 12.—The outcome of Monday's election in Maine is awaited with considerable interest at the headquarters of the Republican and Democratic national committees in this city. As in the case of Vermont, the result of the September election in that state in the presidential year is regarded as a straw to show which way the wind is blowing for the big contest in November. Not only does the experience in past years have shown that the indication is not always a trustworthy one, it will win, but if the plurality is reduced it will give great satisfaction to the Democratic management. The poll-takers on the Republican side do not hesitate to admit among themselves that the plurality for the Prohibition vote was likely to be reduced from the big figure that have been rolled up in years gone by. It will be due entirely to the fact that the contest is fought out on state issues and without regard to questions of figures in the national campaign for the presidency. For this reason Vermont is a much more reliable barometer in character than the November results. In Maine there are several state issues around which the election revolves which are not nearly so prominent.

not have receded if Adams or Davis had been at the head of the ticket. But Greeley was simple as a child in practical politics, however able and profound he was in theory. No greater campaign speeches have ever been delivered than those made by Greeley on the stump in 1872. As he had denounced slavery in the south in the name of humanity, he now denounced the struggle for the same against the he had denounced the political corruption of the slave oligarchy before the war, he now denounced the money corruption that was beginning its long reign.

Now Wall Street Gets Busy. Suddenly a shiver of fear and distrust swept over the country. Would Greeley, who had been unable to keep the Democratic party together, be able to administer? A business administration? Would Greeley, who was the dupe of every shrewd politician, be any better than Grant in selecting advisers? What was his financial policy? None Ever More So Than the Fateful Politics of 1872 Made—Losing Fight on Rottenness and Carpet-bagery—Greeley's Death.

Washington, Sept. 12.—The presidential campaign of 1872 resulted in a tragedy—the insanity and death of Horace Greeley. It took the organization of the Republican party out of the hands of the men who had founded it and turned it over to another group of Republicans, in whose control it remained until after the rise of Roosevelt. It added to the lexicon of Democratic party history the phrase "the Greeley fiasco." And, more important than all, it marked the beginning of the end of the liberal party organization, and was responsible for an independent press. In view of the importance of the American party system, it is remarkable that the most conspicuous example of the survival of the fittest in the country of the New York Tribune, which Greeley founded and with which he made the Republican party.

The Liberal Republican movement of 1872 was the most considerable defection of the party since its movement since its organization. Its effect on the party was not disastrous, but it carried into the Senate a number of the men who were most prominent in the early days of Republicanism. It is a remarkable fact that more than two-thirds of the men prominent in the Republican conventions of 1856 and 1860 died Democrats, or Independents.

Great Republicans Forsake Grant.
Meanwhile General Grant's administration was alienating old-time Republican leaders. The scores of men who Grant was a great soldier, but his most ardent admirers cannot commend his administration. Scandals which had not number were continually arising. The Democratic press, headed by the Missouri Republican, now the St. Louis Republic, and the Louisville Courier-Journal, broke up into conventional meetings and called the "new departure" as the political salvation of the land. The V. Vandigham party of the movement was lost sight of, and Editor Grover of St. Louis and Editor Watson of Louisville became the leaders in the Democratic ranks.
