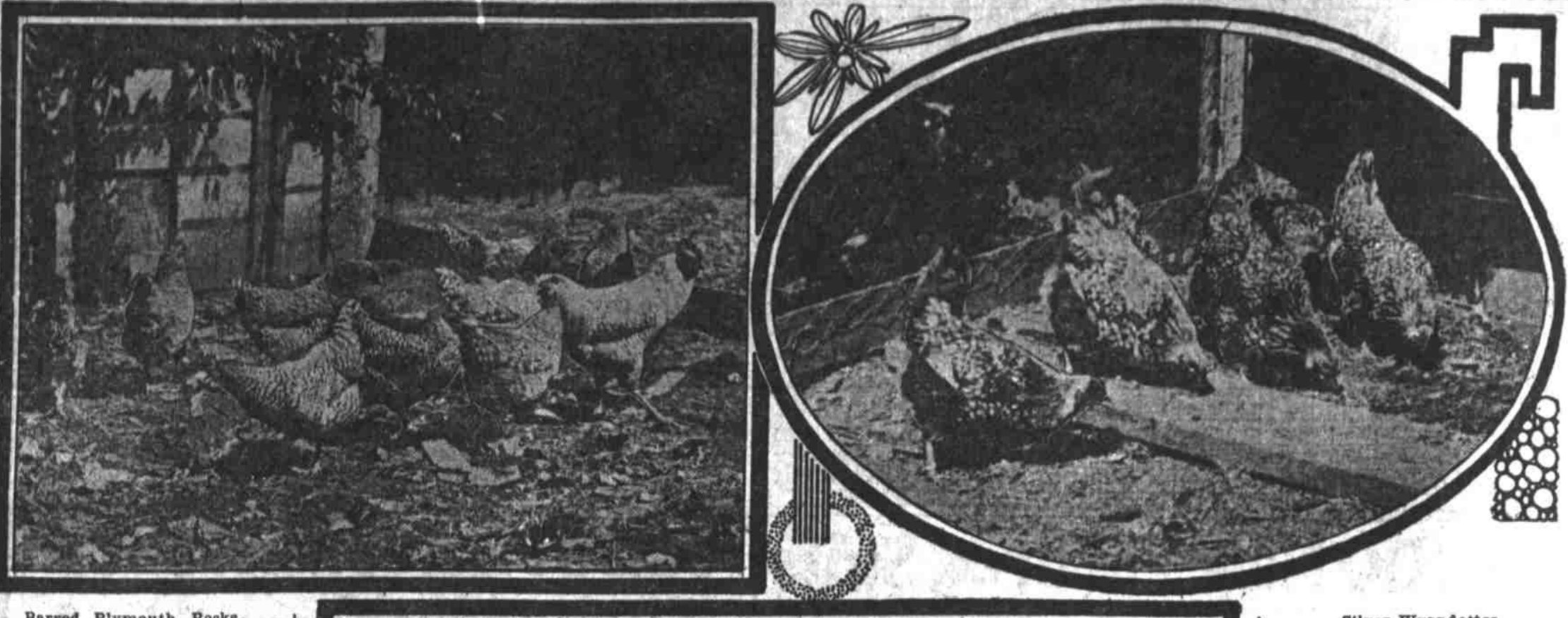


FINEST FEATHERED ONES WILL BE DISPLAYED

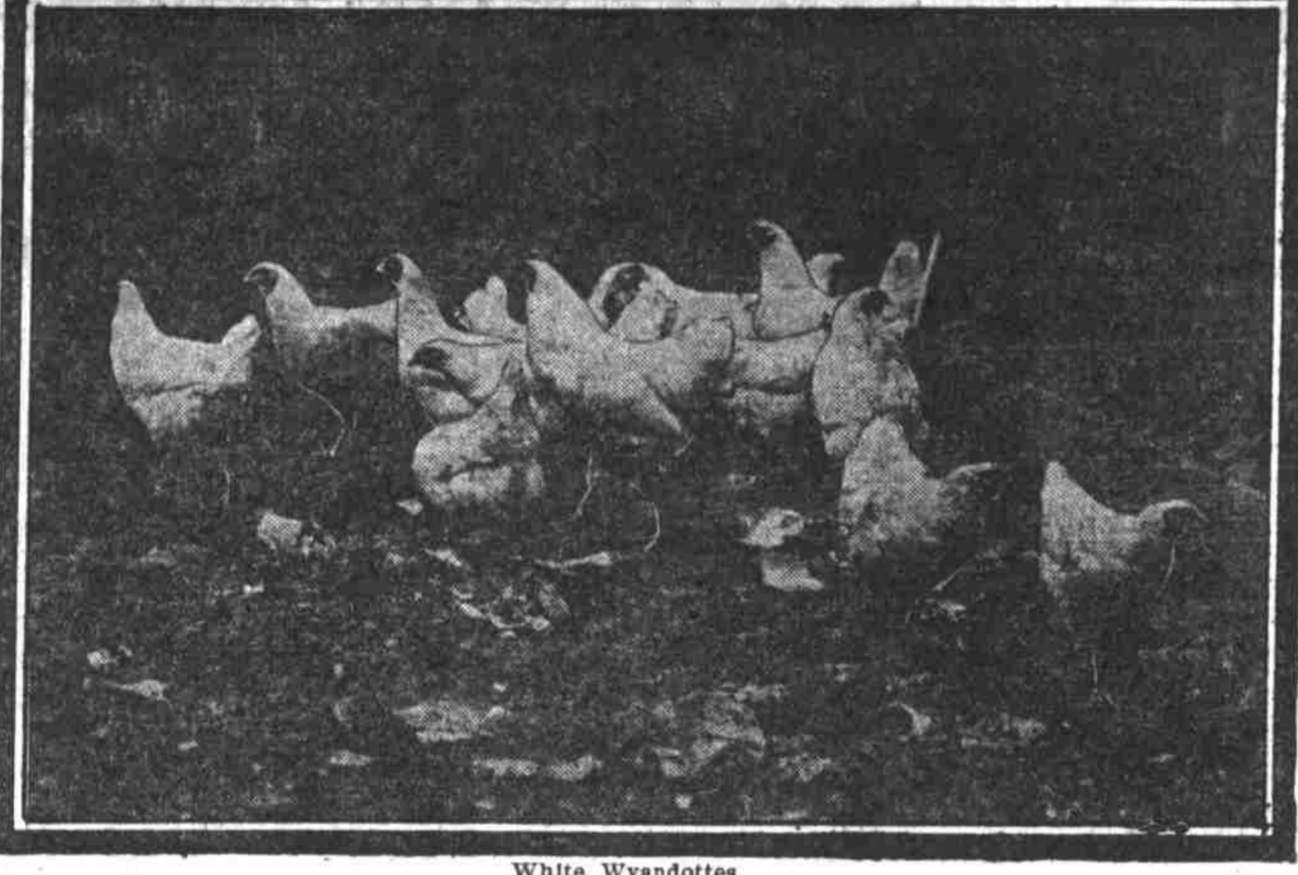
Cash prizes amounting to \$500 will be awarded the winning fowls in every division of all the different classes.

BARLEY MARKET RULES WEAKER IN THE SOUTH

Easier Tone Noted in the Trade—Oats Prices Are Holding Steady.

(Hearst News by Longest Leased Wire.)
San Francisco, Sept. 12.—Wheat market features during last week, prices being unchanged and trading light. Today's receipts were 5,700 cents, including 5,240 cents from Washington.

Barley was easy to weak and oats were firm, both being quiet. The receipts of barley were 6,150 cents and 13,935 cents oats, the latter including 2,440 cents from the north. Most of the oats, 10,920 cents, came from the coast. There were large receipts of hay, amounting to 1,322 tons, but the market was well sustained for the choice grades.

Butter received 10 per pound for California extra, the market closing with a steady tone for all fresh grades. Extra eggs were advanced 10 per dozen, and all grades closed steady. There was no change in cheese. California fats were steady and the market quiet.

While in the past week there was a more active market, prices were generally weak, as the receipts were more than ample and at the close today the market had a rather congested appearance of the most seasonable fruits. Apples have been in extra large supply, and pears are again crowding the market. There were no settled prices for nutmeg melons, except for the freshest, which were offered at 10 cents a dozen. There have been a few boxes of peaches from Newcastle sold at 11 cents per box.

With heavy receipts of potatoes during the week the market dragged at weaker prices, shipping orders having fallen off. Onions have also ruled weak. For fancy green corn good prices have been obtained, but most of the sacked has been poor quality. In other lines there was a little improvement today for fresh offerings.

YOUNG TURKEY THEIR EXAMPLE

Persian Rebels Take Counsel of Their Methods and Hope of Their Success.

(United Press Leased Wire.)
Odessa, Sept. 12.—According to roundabout messages from Tabriz today, the Persian army is again on the verge of revolt and it is thought the anti-royalists will be able to hold out in their quarter of the city until aid can come to them from the Turkish frontier.

A campaign of assassinations is being waged against the leaders of the anti-royalists. A number of leaders have been slain in the streets during the past week and the rebels believe their slayers are either traitors among their own number hired for the work, or are spies smuggled through their lines for the purpose of the shah's troops in the field against them.
