

**RICE TO SURVEY
LAKE AND GRANT**
C. & O. Engineer to Have
Charge of Land Opening
in Eastern Oregon.

G. W. Rice, of the chief engineer's department, Chesapeake & Ohio, railroad, has been appointed chief engineer of the Oregon Valley Land company's large project in southern Oregon east of the Cascades, where during the next 15 months the company will cut 300,000 acres of grant lands into a plat containing 11,000 farms, and will install an irrigation system to furnish water to about 400 acres of land in the Goose Lake valley.

"New buildings are going up all over Lakeview, and yet it is impossible to rent a house at any price," Mr. Rice said to a Journal reporter. "The new \$50,000 courthouse for Lake county is nearly completed, and is a fine building, built entirely out of the county's surplus. The people over there in Lake county seem to know nothing about the money panic of last year excepting through the newspapers."

Regarding the railroad surveys that are now being carried on in that part of Oregon, Mr. Rice spoke with the assurance of a railroad engineer who knows from outward signs that actual railroad construction is intended. He said:

"From the care taken in the surveys and the low grades established, I am thoroughly convinced that the line from Redding, Cal., up the Pitt river to the Goose Lake valley, and on north to a connection with the Oregon Eastern, will be built soon by the Harriman line, and will become their through trunk line from San Francisco to Portland and to the east. All this is having a strong influence on property values in Lake and Harney counties. Unimproved lands in the vicinity of Lakeview are held as high as \$125 per acre, and lots in a new addition to the town are selling at \$100 to \$150 per acre."

The company's irrigation project in the Goose Lake valley is estimated to cost about \$1,500,000. The project will secure water from Cottonwood river and Drowns river, on both of which streams ideal reservoir sites have been secured. The Cottonwood reservoir will require a dam 90 feet high and 1,100 feet long. There will be eight miles of main canal leading into the valley, and between this canal and the reservoir a section two miles long will have a width of 30 feet and depth of 4 feet, bringing the water through the canyon. The Cottonwood reservoir will, it is said, furnish ample water for the company's lands, and Drowns river will be held in reserve for future development.

**PROTECTION FOR
HOME PRODUCERS**

Equalizing Tariff on Imports Necessary to Prosperity, Says Senator.

Allentown, Pa., Sept. 12.—Dwelling upon the nation's dependence on a protective tariff for prosperity, United States Senator Penrose fired the opening gun of the Republican state campaign at Pleasant Corners today, preceding a barbecue by the Republicans of Lehigh county. County Chairman Blumer called the meeting to order and Alexander N. Ulrich presided.

Senator Penrose asserted that a protective tariff and prosperity have always gone hand in hand, and that industrial depression had always followed any attempt to lower the tariff. He said:

"The long period of depression which followed the return to the tariff immediately following Blaine's defeat for the presidency continued during the entire period of the low tariff and until relief was obtained by the return to protection."

He said a general revision of the tariff would be made.

"But whatever changes are made," he continued, "the Republican party this year stands pledged to the principle that a tariff shall be imposed on all imported products, whether of factory, farm or mine, sufficiently great to equal the difference between the cost of production abroad and at home. As a member of the senate committee I pledge myself to sustain the protective principle."

Other speakers were Congressman Moore and J. H. Langham of Indiana.

**DUKE SPENDS HIS

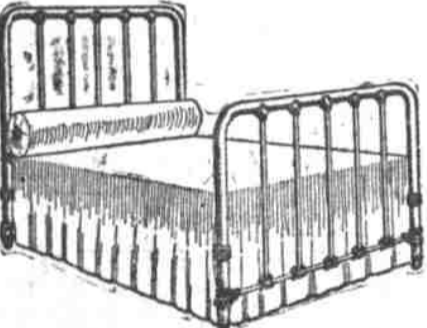

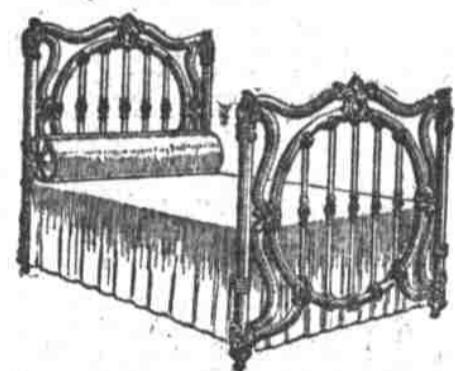

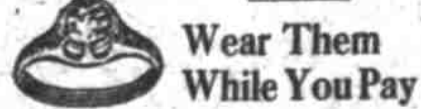
