

REAL ESTATE ARE THE VERY ELECT OF THE TRUST CROWD—MISREPRESENTATIONS AS TO GOMPERS REFUTED. POLICE HUNT FOR SLAYERS OF A. T. THOMAS AND ARSON BELIEVED TO BE RESULT OF QUARREL. STATE SENATOR RETURNS FROM EAST, WHERE HE DECLARES, DEMOCRATIC NOMINEE IS WAY TO THE GOOD—WATTERSON SEES BRYAN'S ELECTION. Taft's Chief Lieutenants Are of the Very Elect of the Trust Crowd—Misrepresentations As to Gompers Refuted.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal) Chicago, Sept. 14.—Republican voters are apparently not taking kindly to the guardians of reform whom Mr. Taft has drafted from the big trusts and monopolies to compose his financial, executive and advisory committees, and who will conduct his campaign. The independent press of the country is practically unanimous in denouncing the appointment of William Nelson Cromwell, the personal and legal representative of E. H. Harriman and a conspicuous trust lawyer, as a member of the Republican executive and advisory committee. The selection of General T. Coleman Dupont of the powder trust as a member of the Republican national committee, is also coming in for a share of this criticism. A public demand for the resignation of General Dupont as a member of the Republican national executive committee on the ground that his connection with an indicted trust trust him for the position has been made by Alfred O. Crozier of Wilmington, Del., a prominent lawyer and author. Mr. Crozier, who is a near neighbor of Dupont, has written an open letter to President Roosevelt, in which he says: "The selection of General Dupont as a member of the Republican national executive committee and as director and chief of the orators' bureau is a serious menace to the success of the campaign. To put this president and organizer of one of the most powerful of all trusts at the head of the entire speaking campaign, with complete authority to select all the orators who will, is grotesque, in view of the platform declarations of our party respecting trusts. But when this is now done, it is a general, charged with law-breaking, and General T. Coleman Dupont and the United States senator, Henry A. DuPont, are both enjoined as defendants, the appointment must seem ridiculous. "The campaign, however, is over, will largely center round 'malefactors of great wealth,' those who, with artificial panics, margin gambling that totals \$9 billions annually, trust consolidation and railroad manipulation, are eating alive the progress and prosperity of the people. "How important, then, that our party organization and campaign be purged in its management of all such 'malefactors' for the people this year, and thinking with eyes and ears wide open. "The case against the powder trust is set for hearing before election. The government thinks it has sufficient evidence to sustain its very serious charges. What will be the effect of the disclosures before the voters? Will they be postponed after election. It will cause belief that an inquiry both in preparation for a reward service being prepared in this campaign by the head of that trust." "There is much misrepresentation in the press of the attitude of organized labor with respect to the position taken by Samuel Gompers, John Mitchell and other leaders of the Federation of Labor, who take the position that the election of Bryan and Kern is for the best interests of the country. Practical proof of this statement was given in Chicago when the various branches of the Federation of Labor in this city with practical unanimity voted to sustain Mr. Gompers in his advocacy of the election of the Democratic national ticket. The actual results of that important meeting has never been accurately given through the press bureau of the Democratic national committee. Only four votes were cast at this meeting of the representatives of all branches of the Federation of Labor against the Gompers and Mitchell program, and those were the votes of Socialists, who are opposed to both political parties. The action of the Chicago branch of federated labor was of great importance for the reason that it was the first time in the history of the party that the issue of the endorsement or repudiation of Gompers' course, which the Federation of Labor in Chicago did have followed by branches in New York and other cities. The opposition of Mr. Gompers' course has come largely from Republican circles, which find expression in many of the metropolitan papers of the country. Up to the present time Gompers' course has met with the approval of all organized labor bodies that have taken cognizance of his attitude in national politics. Speaking of the misrepresentation of his fight to have organized labor endorse his course, the following letter, Mr. Gompers wrote the Central Labor union of Brooklyn, N. Y., the following letter:

Recently he sold \$500 worth of horses, here and trouble is thought to have arisen over the deal. It is believed that the murder and arson are the result."

Keenly Disappointed That Asquith Did Not Allow Yesterday's Program.

(United Press Leased Wire) London, Sept. 14.—Cardinal Vannutelli, the papal legate who conducted the great eucharistic congress that adjourned here yesterday afternoon after the procession, is today preparing to depart for Rome and the other cardinals that attended the great gathering are leaving London. It is a matter of common comment that Cardinal Vannutelli and the other Catholic prelates who took part in the procession of yesterday are disappointed because the Asquith government interfered with the arrangements and compelled the procession to be held without the carrying out of the liturgical and the wearing of vestments as had been originally planned. Cardinal Vannutelli in a public interview last night said: "If those who solicited and obtained permission to carry out of the procession intended to impede the faithful with greater enthusiasm they can boast they succeeded even beyond their expectations. "The scene about the cathedral was impressive in the extreme. An army of 16,000 Catholics who had volunteered to hold back the crowds knelt reverently while the cardinals and priests passed through the throng. Reports of the leaders of the protestant alliance are jubilant over their success in forcing the original plans for the procession. They held a meeting last night at which a solemn oath was taken to defend the protestant religion. Catholic spokesmen say that the action of interfering with the arrangements for the procession will never be forgotten. Father Spink, administrator of St. George's Catholic cathedral, refers to the premier's action as one that will go down in history as an insult to millions of Catholics.

M. Staples, Bellingham Man, Two Hundred and Forty Pound Wife Doesn't Spell Marital Happiness.

(United Press Leased Wire) Bellingham, Wash., Sept. 14.—M. Staples and two friends whose names are unknown left this city Friday afternoon in a gasoline launch for a few hours' outing and have not been seen since. The wife of Staples is half crazed with grief because of the disappearance of her husband. The waterfront has been carefully searched, and the crews of incoming boats and launches have been questioned for information regarding the missing craft, but not a word has been heard from it. The weather has been calm since Friday, and friends of the lost men are at a loss to account for the mystery. She was 91 pounds heavier than he was 11 years younger, and was possessed of a nagging disposition. Besides that, she wanted to move every few months, and found particular pleasure in the change of surroundings. He wanted a divorce, and so does she. The description of the wife above given is from the answer and cross-examination filed by Arthur W. Cox this morning in a divorce case filed by Staples. He accuses her of leaving him to work in mining and logging camps, and hints that she was fond of finding employment in such places. He says he took women over to work. He says he took a girl to raise, thinking that she would make a better wife, but instead of that she took the girl to Woodstock. Two months ago she broke into his home, he alleges, and carried away all the furniture. She has her own car, and she has become conductive with a man named Robins or Dobson at Carson Springs, Wash. He claims his new wife weighs 240 pounds. He was married in 1902.

PRISON BREAK KIPPED IN BUD

(United Press Leased Wire) Salt Lake, Utah, Sept. 14.—It became known here today that a desperate plan to bring about delivery from the penitentiary was frustrated yesterday by Warden Pratt. Among the leaders was "Abie" Majors, a famous Oakland, Cal., criminal, who is serving a life term for killing Captain of Police Brown at Ogden. Reports of the plan were obtained by Warden Pratt from a letter from a man who had been in contact with the prisoners. The plan was to break out of the prison at night, and to make a dash for it. The warden was alerted by a guard, and the prisoners were taken back to their cells. The warden is now looking for the man who leaked the information.

RUMOR STARTS STOCKS MOVING

(United Press Leased Wire) New York, Sept. 14.—A rumor in financial circles today that the Union Pacific would surrender control of the Southern Pacific providing it was given control of the Central Pacific somewhat startled Wall street today, and that it was believed probable was shown by the way the market reacted.
