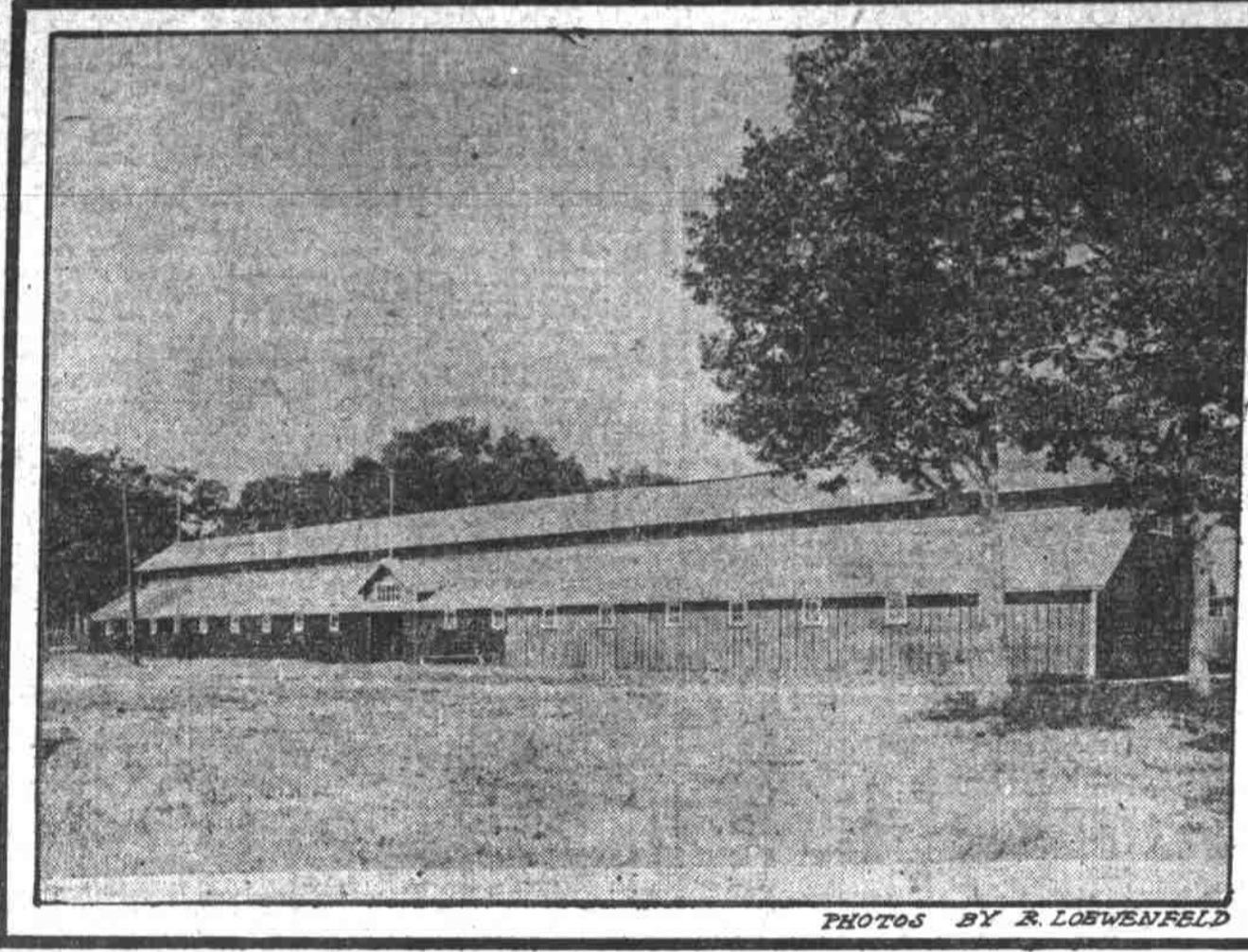
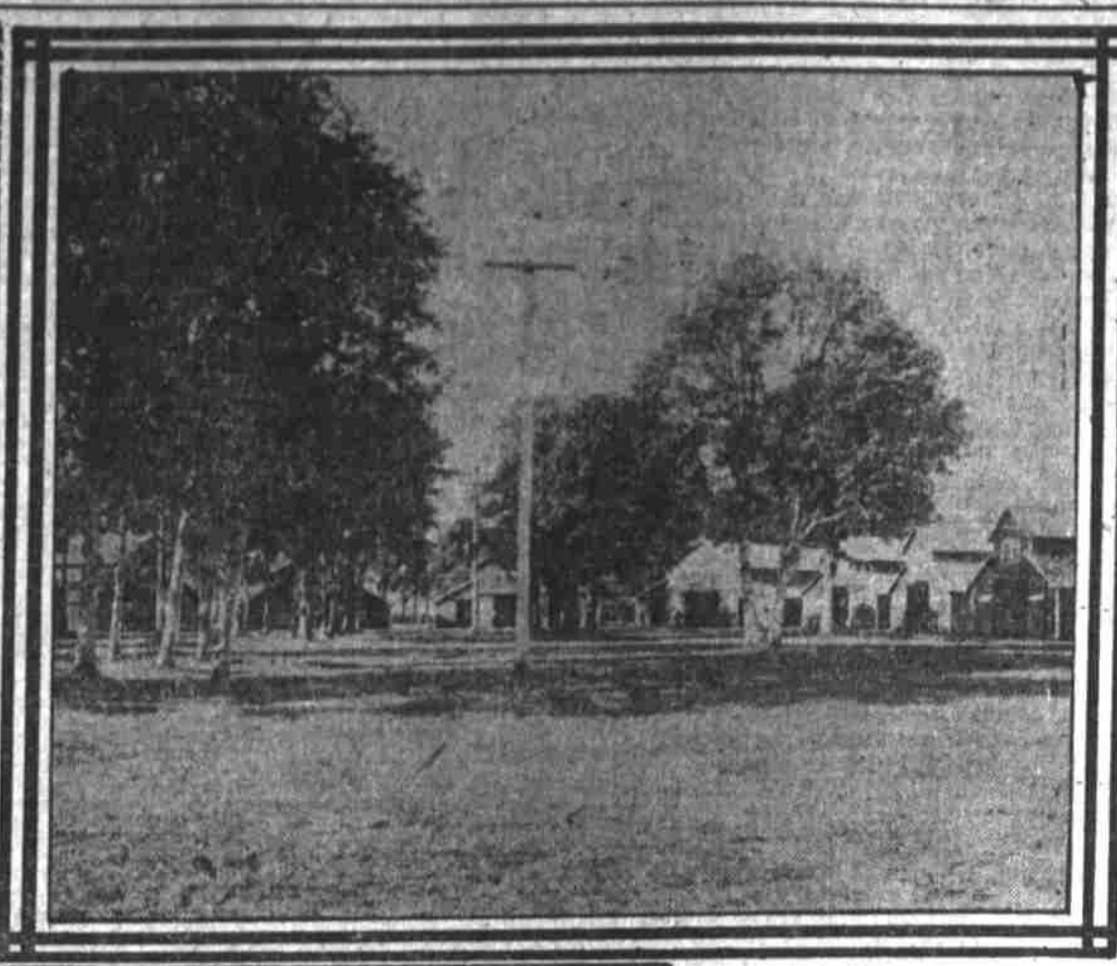
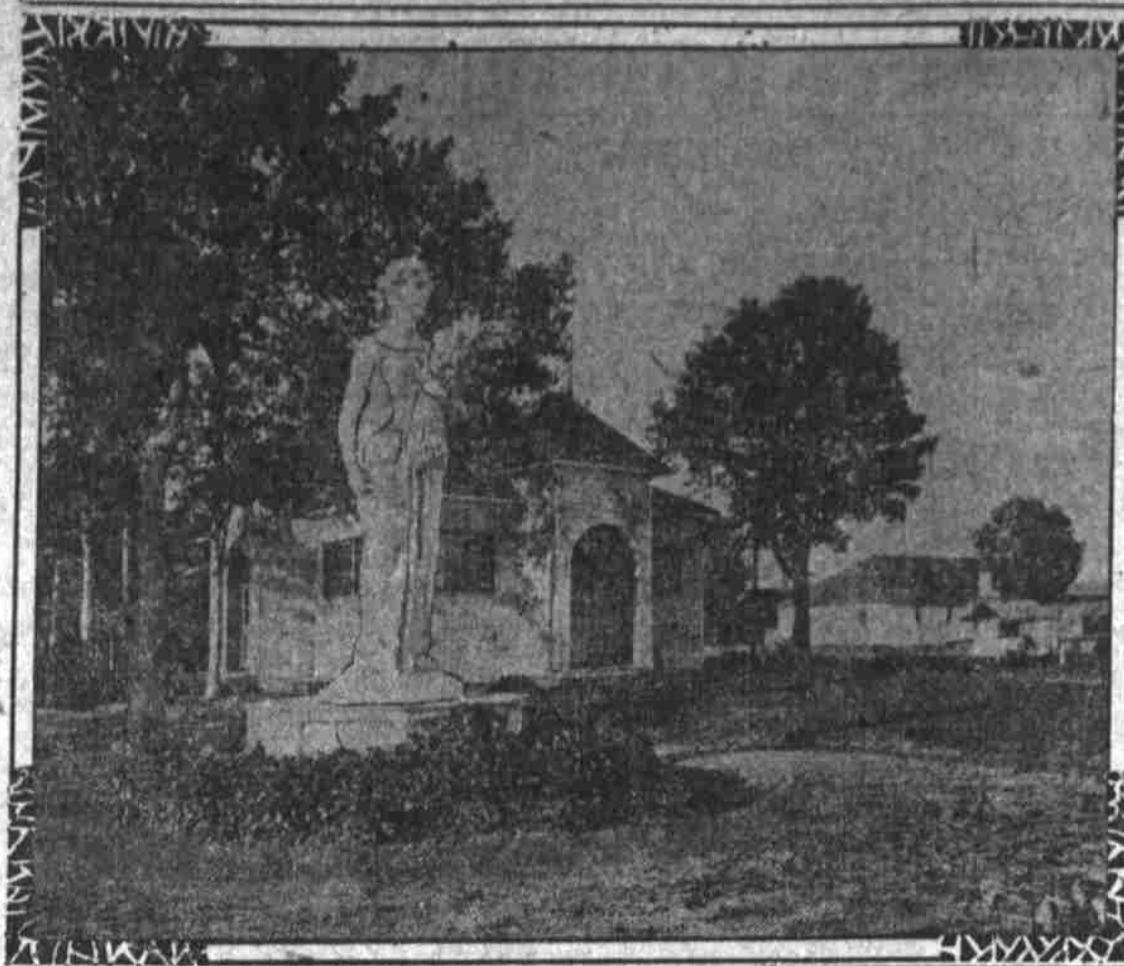


STATE FAIR AT SALEM BEST EXHIBITION HELD IN YEARS
