FOREMAN OF GRAND JURY IS ACCUSED OF FRAUD

A. E. Davis, foreman of the Multnomah county grand jury, is accused of fraud in the management of the defunct Hygienic Mattress company in a complaint filed in the circuit court by W. E. Ferrell, assignee of the estate of the insolvent concern.

Davis was president of the company, which failed many months ago, and he is now charged with framing matters, through the device of dummy directors, so that \$500 was voted him as a monthly salary.

He got the salary for four months only, but the assignee claims that \$467 of it should be paid back and that Foreman Davis is also indebted to the concern for the amount of \$15,100 for shares of stock that he holds, but never paid for.

Besides all this, the assignee charges that Davis represented that the company was worth \$600,000, when only \$10,000 of the capital stock had been paid in, and that by this means he was able to obtain an excessive rating in the report of Bradstreet's.

Other defendants in the suit with Davis are H. H. McCarthy, vice-president of the company; R. E. Norton, the secretary; G. E. Emery, and a Mr. Hendee. The history of the affair goes back to 1904, when McCarthy and M. W. Bruner entered into a contract with the Oregon Fine Needle Fiber company.

The chief creditor of the concern is Davis himself, who has presented a claim for \$4,535 for unpaid salary. Assignee Ferrell denies the merit of this claim and asserts that the balance is the other way. He says that Davis' services were reasonably worth \$150 per month, and over and over that he has already been paid.

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When the company was organized, says the complaint, for the purpose of cheating and defrauding the creditors of the company, a resolution was passed for a contract with McCarthy, Norton and Emery by which they were

to turn over the contract of McCarthy and Bruner with the fiber company. As compensation for turning over this contract, it is stated, McCarthy received 100 shares, Norton 200 and Emery 100. This, it is declared, was the only compensation given for the shares, no money being paid.

In January, 1905, it is stated, Norton assigned 100 shares to Davis, that McCarthy assigned 51 shares to him as trustee, that McCarthy assigned five shares to Hendee, and that Norton assigned five shares to Hendee.

The assignee thus figures that Davis holds 151 shares that he has never paid for, and in like manner it is charged that McCarthy owes \$4,900, Emery \$3,500, Norton \$3,500, and Hendee \$1,600.

Mr. Ferrell states that he has realized \$2,034 on the assets of the mattress company, while the claims amount to \$10,000. He says it is necessary to raise \$10,000 to cover the claims of creditors, and he wants the defendants ordered to pay in enough hard cash to satisfy all claims and wind up the business.

The assignee also wants the \$500 salary resolution declared void. He says that the contract for handling the fiber company business was turned in in return for stock.
