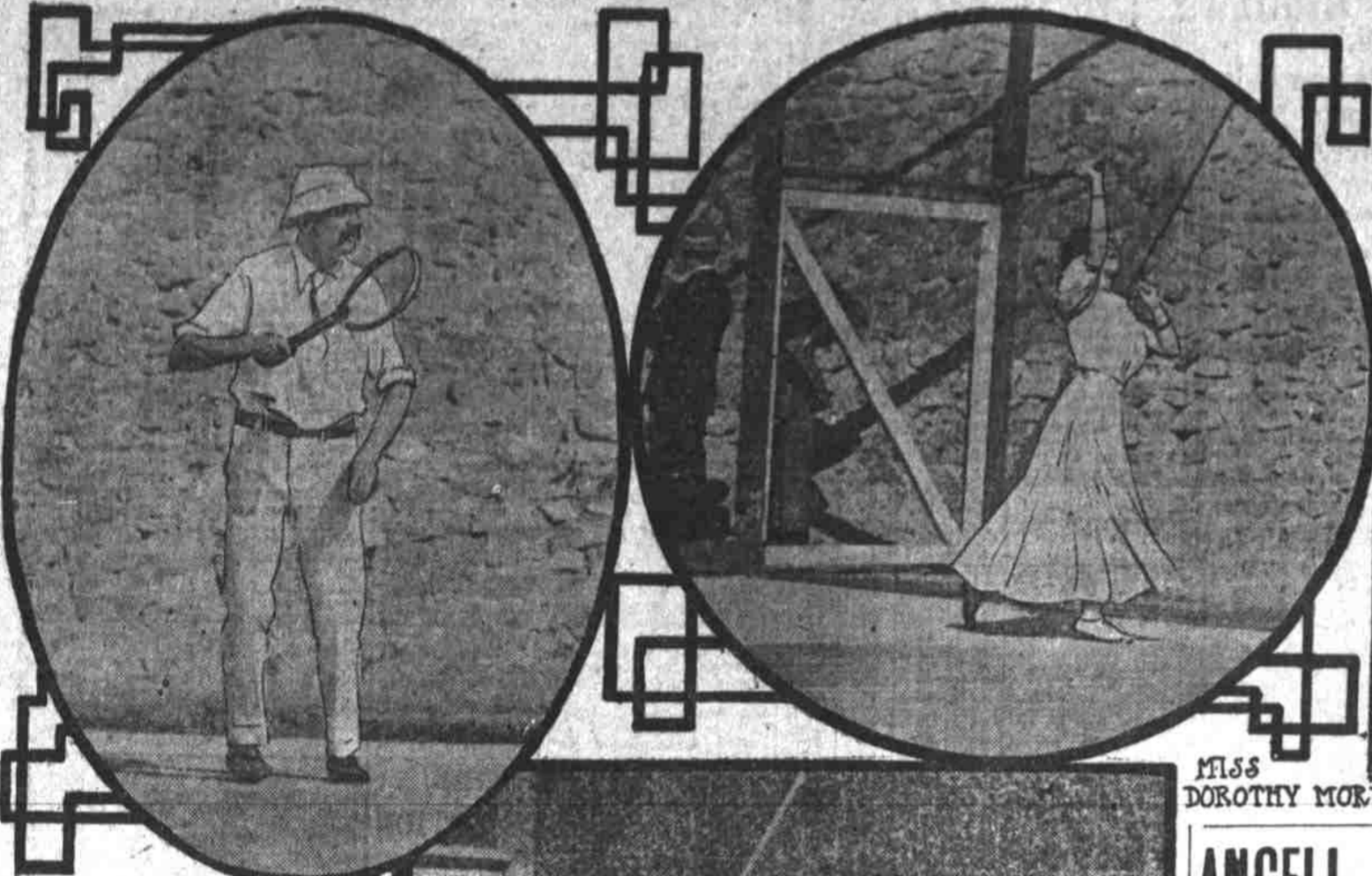

WELSH MAY GET TRY AT BATTLING NELSON

English Lightweight and Italian Carsey Will Go 10 Rounds Tonight.

Los Angeles, Cal., Sept. 15.—Fight fans anticipate one of the hottest 10-round battles ever held here when Frank Carsey, the rugged Italian and Freddie Welsh, the English champion, meet at Naud Junction in a 10-round go tonight.

Although Carsey is given the credit of having had the best of two "no decision" affairs at Philadelphia, Welsh is the favorite since the Italian met defeat at the hands of Phil Brock. Carsey is confident, however, that he can best the Englishman.

Welsh is going out for blood tonight. Battling Nelson has promised him a chance at the lightweight championship if he knocks out his opponent and the Englishman has been busily developing a punch that he thinks will do the work.

Nelson's proposition was made when Welsh was matched against Phil Brock and though Carsey has been substituted for Brock the offer still stands.

Berkeley High Wants Game with Portland. Manager Bruce Schumann of the West Portland High school football team received a letter yesterday from the manager of the Berkeley high school of Berkeley, Cal., asking for a game to be played in California some time this fall. Although the local boys would be glad to take the matter up, they will be unable to take the trip owing to the expense. Should this be an exceptionally good year, however, the trip might possibly be made during the Christmas holidays.

ANGELL FAVORS OUTDOOR SPORTS

Oregon Agricultural College Physical Director Tells of "Gym" Improvements.

"The Oregon Agricultural college is preparing for an active season in athletics," said E. D. Angell, the physical director yesterday. "The college has grown so rapidly that the gymnasium will soon be inadequate for the thousands of men who are expected to register next week. Fifteen hundred dollars is being expended on new lockers, shower baths and the remodeling of offices. Modern sanitary steel front combination lockers will replace the old and a new heating device with added tankage will keep a constant supply of over 200 gallons of hot water on hand all of the time. The new showers will add materially to the attractiveness of the gymnasium. All entering freshmen are required to take work in physical education and after a thorough physical examination they will be assigned to the work best suited to their individual needs. The department of physical education lines and men will therefore be given the privilege of going out for one of the various athletic teams. The fall work will be football, track or cross-country running, and this plan of training all men in outdoor sports should ultimately furnish many candidates for the regular college teams."

CUE CHAMPIONSHIP TO BE SETTLED TONIGHT
