With Jack Grane pitching big brush ball, Phil Cooney fielding to perfection, Hal Danzig hitting like a Wagner, and a new umpire officiating square, Portland had a little trouble beating Harry Sutor and the Soles yesterday, 4 to 0. Grane had the visitors completely mystified, as the two widely scattered singles hit attention. There never was a moment when he was not full master of the situation. On the other hand Sutor had the original wild man faded to a fare-thee-well. The fifty one from the south was as generous with his passes as Bull Perrine with his rank decisions.

Sutor had a habit of filling up the bags and Danzig was as prompt in unloading them. It was as pretty a battle between the two southpaws as one could wish to see. They even carried the banner in their tossing to each other. Grane was here the victor also, for he never allowed the Texan to touch the ball during the engagement. Grane also whiffed three times, but on his fourth up awaited the sphere into right field for an out. On the whole Grane got good revenge over Sutor for taking that 20-inning game away from him upon the last date of the previous series between the two teams.

The umpiring of Flynn, a new man who worked last season in the southern league, was a positive relief. Flynn continually hurried the players along and could brook no interference from the disgruntled, of whom there were several among the visitors. If Flynn keeps on as he has begun he will soon win the respect of the fans. Alex Cheyne, a local product, took care of the decisions on the bag with much credit. Sutor got off badly at the outset. He had much difficulty in locating the plate and walked Casey Cooney and Johnson as a starter. Then Big Danzig ripped off a clean single over second that scored Casey and Cooney. Rattery made a fluke sacrifice which moved Ote up a notch. When Bessy beat a tattoo on Nick Williams' shins with a screaming grasper and Ote crossed the plate while Bessy connected safely with the first station.

In the second inning affairs were shaping around for a run for the southerners. Melchior beat out a bunt and when Grane heaved the ball short and it went wild, Melchior continued all the way around to third. The sturdy Cleveland lad pulled himself together and oozed both Williams and Beck and Ote Johnson took care of Berry's grounders.

# COACH NORCROSS OF O. A. C. HERE

Famous Michigan Football Players Visiting in Portland—Dr. Steckle Back

Two prominent former Michigan football men were in town today in the persons of F. S. Norcross, the famous coach of the Oregon Agricultural college, and Dr. A. C. Steckle, former coach at the same place. Steckle was coach at O. A. C. during 1904 and '05 and Norcross succeeded him in 1906 and '07. Norcross brought the team to its highest development last season, when the "Aggies" won the Pacific coast championship by defeating the University of Oregon and St. Vincent's college at Los Angeles.
