CARRIED OUT MURDER THREAT

Jap Swore He'd Kill Okaski, Then Cut Off His Finger to Seal Vengeance Compact—Invited Victim to Dinner, Then Shot Him Across the Table. "I will keep my oath and kill him, and this is how I prove it." Laying his left hand upon the table before him, "Fighting" Ito, a Japanese, whipped out a sharp pocket knife and cut off the end of the little finger, amputating it neatly at the last joint. All this became known to the Los Angeles police after Ito had killed K. Okaski in February. Ito, his sworn enemy, willingly undertook the task, and the Los Angeles police, who were sent word of the deed, were notified. Ito sent word to Okaski that he hoped they could become friends again, and in proof of new affection he invited Okaski to a dinner.
