

ROADS' MEETING AT HOOD RIVER

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Hood River, Or., Sept. 17.—Hood River will have two big meetings Saturday for the purpose of agitating the good roads question and much enthusiasm is being manifested in the matter by local organizations. The meetings will be addressed by Judge L. R. Webster and Judge J. H. Scott. They will be held under the auspices of the Hood River Commercial club and business men and ranchers have been invited to attend. The question of better roads is causing widespread interest at Hood River on account of the fact that the immense apple crops that are expected in the next few years will necessitate improved transportation facilities. It is estimated that in five years Hood River will be marketing in the neighborhood of 3,000,000 boxes of apples. This, it is said, will make it imperative to have roads over which the fruit can be transported expeditiously without danger of bruising. One of the propositions for securing better roads is to secure a special act of the legislature allowing the county to bond for that purpose. If this can be done it is planned to construct 100 miles of permanent highways in the county in connection with the projected road from Hood River to Portland, the new roads are expected to give this section the best highways in the state.

WEATHER REPORT The Nevada disturbance has moved northeastward to Wyoming, and there has been a marked rise in pressure over Nevada and also over the Canadian northwest. The eastern high pressure area has contracted in area and is now central over West Virginia. The barometer is relatively low over the west and states and along the New England coast. Thunderstorms have occurred in Utah, Idaho and Montana, and heavy rain has fallen in southern Texas. It is much cooler in Utah, Nevada and the Canadian northwest, and slightly cooler in California. The temperatures have risen in the New England states and the upper Mississippi valley. The indications are for fair weather in this district Friday, preceded by showers tonight in Idaho. It will be cooler tonight in eastern Oregon, eastern Washington and Idaho, and light frosts may be expected in southern and eastern Oregon and western Washington, and possibly also in northern and southwestern Idaho.
