

QUESTIONS OF WAR AT G. C. P. HEADQUARTERS

There is an air of solemnity around Republican headquarters today that does not appear to differ in any essential particular from Gloom—with a big G. It might be expected that after Ormsby McArthur, the personal representative of National Chairman Hitchcock, had succeeded in "reconciling the warring factions" and had departed serene in the belief that he had straightened out all the tangles and left nothing for the local Republican war horses to do but to go in and win, everything would be lovely and headquarters would have a joyous, not to mention a contented atmosphere. But not so.

Money—rather the lack of it—is the cause of the somberity. The appointment of Dr. H. C. Coe as national treasurer for Oregon was announced yesterday by Ralph W. Williams, the executive committee, but the sad part of it all is that Mr. Coe is treasurer without a treasury. There are no funds on hand, to speak of, and it is up to Dr. Coe to get out and rustle some.

True, there is a paltry little thousand dollars on hand in the form of check sent to Chairman Calkins by the national committee and turned over by him to the executive committee. This money is to be used only for paying the expenses of a poll of the state. And anyway, what is a thousand dollars to a Republican state central committee, which by all rights ought to be handling great sales of the long green full dinner pails, or the simoniacal full dinner pails, that is troubling Secretary McArthur and Treasurer Coe, where to get campaign funds to spend on the financial tree and the sap does not run well at this time of year.

Like cohorts are ready to shout long and loud and to join any number of Taft clubs, but when it comes to actually doing anything, they are so miserably reluctant that they are almost impossible to start out on. It is probable that he will appoint sub-committees to assist him and vigorous and pathetic appeals will be made to the stalwarts who are blessed with a goodly share of this world's goods. Even the man who can and will come through with one hundred or even the insignificant sum of two bits, will be greeted as a long lost brother and endowed with a campaign button and all the literature he can assimilate or disseminate.

Secretary McArthur is busy today, in addition to the usual hear to heart talks with precinct chairmen and possible recruits to the working force, in getting out circular letters to the heads of precinct clubs with a view to expanding that thousand dollars in making a poll of the state. He hopes to have the returns all in ten days or two weeks.

Dr. Coe's work in endeavoring to secure campaign contributions has another disheartening feature besides the difficulty he is certain to find in coaxing the reluctant dollar out of the security buttoned pocket of the Republican voter. That is that the funds secured are not to be expended in Oregon. All that is collected must be sent to the National committee. Perhaps a pitance may be returned, but not much. Secretary McArthur stated this morning that virtually all of the money would be divided among the doubtful states. The Republican National committee is siding Oregon safe, and is willing to let the campaign managers of this state get along on wind, literature and Taft and Sherman buttons. The wind is all ready on hand, and three big boxes of literature were received at Republican headquarters this morning. Secretary McArthur is today sending in an order for the buttons. Those which have heretofore been distributed have borne only the picture of Taft. But something occurred to remind the campaign managers there they had also a date for the vice-presidency, and they thought it would be the decent thing to

R. L. Harriman, starter at the Oregon fair, spoke to the immense throng in the grandstand at the race track today afternoon and congratulated them on their fair which he said was the greatest west of the Mississippi river. Mr. Harriman visited the Kansas state fair at Topeka and the Colorado state fair at Denver on his way west this year.

"What I have to say," said Mr. Harriman, "I have no authority to speak. ELOPES WITH SCHOOLMATE

School Girl of Chesterfield, Mass., Mysteriously Disappears From Home.

Miss Hilbert was a student at Smith college, and her disappearance has caused great concern at the institution, where she was last seen. It is believed that Bradley arranged to meet the girl at the college Sunday and that they are now on their way to the northwest.

Theories that the girl was kidnaped or met with a fatal play are not based on evidence. The police have been informed that Bradley had been seen here last week.

Telegrams were sent today to the police at Yakima, asking them to look out for the couple. Bradley left here two months ago to enter the fruit raising business at Yakima.

PETRICH MUST HANG IS JURY'S VERDICT

Seattle, Wash., Sept. 17.—Unless the case is remanded for a new trial by the supreme court or a stay of proceedings granted, Nick Petrich, the Serf, accused of the murder of Marshal Harry Miller of Kent on the night of April 10, last, will be sentenced to hang by Judge A. W. Frazer, according to the verdict of the jury in the case, brought in yesterday afternoon after deliberating over the evidence for four hours.

Petrich was charged with murder in the first degree, the penalty for which is death by hanging.
