It is also required in the law that the petition must be filed not less than four mouths before election day. That day will be the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1910.

The transition from frown to smile is due to the fact that the reports of the deputies who are patrolling the waters of the Columbia last night assured their chief that there would be practically no further opposition to the enforcement of the laws by Oregon's officials.

The vigorous and impartial factics of the patrolmen acting under instructions

the vigorous and impartial tactions the patrolimen noting under instructions from Warden McAllister have had the effect of stopping all illegal fishing. The fishermen prefer to wait until the supreme court of the United States has passed upon the validity of the Nielson decision made by the Oregon supreme court to taking the chance of having to pay large fines.

Meanwhile Assistant Attorney General Knickerbocker of Seattle and MacDonald of Spokane are preparing data from two circuit court cases which decided the Oregon laws invalid, and upon this data they will base their request for an injunction from the federal court prohibiting Warden McAllister from enforcing the Oregon laws in Washington waters until after the Nielson case has been passed upon by the supreme court. The attorney general of Washington will at once appeal the mooted decision of the Oregon court to the highest tribunal in the country.

F. A. Scuffert, the canneryman of The Dalles, from whom Mr. McAllister confiscated a carlond of salmon this week, was in Portland last night. He told the warden that he has cessed fishing.
