



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
The body of Dr. Fred R. Chaney, who was killed last week while scaling a mountain peak near Valdez, Alaska, will arrive in Portland tomorrow morn-ing. The body is being brought to Se-attle on the steamer Pennsylvania, and is expected to arrive some time this afternoon or evening. The funeral of the young man will take place Monday afternoon at 4 o'clock from the Elks' temple. Mrs. F. B. Chaney, the boy's mother, lives at 55 East Fourteenth street. Dr. Chaney was born in Brooklyn, N. Y., in 1885, and came to Oregon with his parents when he was 6 years old. He graduated from the Sunnyside gram-mar school, the high school, and in 1903 entered the medical department of the state university, where he graduated with the class of 1907. About 14 months ago he went to Valdez to prac-tice medicine.
