"Something has got to be done," said Mr. Schmidt, "or the fishing industry on the Columbia river will be ruined. In my opinion, the season ought not to open before May 15; certainly not before May 1. From April 15 to May 15 the business is run at a loss anywas. Let the fish have those extra days to get up the river. It's the only thing that will save the fishing industry.

"And fishing at the bar must be stopped. I say that and I'm located at the mouth of the river. We're simply driving the fish away, and they are going up to Puget sound in greater numbers every year. The king salmon that they catch in the sound are nothing but our chinook salmon that have been turned away from the mouth of the river they are caught in the wheels and traps along the stream. It won't be long until the river will be fished out.

"Nearly all of us who are in business on the river have fished in the eastern rivers before we came out here, and we have seen streams that were simply teeming with fish entirely cleaned out. I have seen it that way down in Florida, too, where rivers have fished in the enstern rivers before we came out mild a o'clock Monday morning.

"Think most of the caunerymen are inclined to be reasonable, and are ready to do what is right. But we must have laws in the two states that are harmonious. There ought to be a commission appointed, made up of members from both Oregon and Washington, to see that legislation is enacted at the coming sessions of the two legislatures that walli

### COURT GRANTS NON SUIT IN WHITE CASE

Holding that an employer cannot be made to pay a commission to any one who interests himself in securing an investor in its stock, unless the employer has authorized the outsider to act for him. Judge Cleland in the circuit court yesterday granted a nonsuit in the case of E. W. White against the Kilham Stationery & Printing company.

The testimony showed that White had learned through an employe of the company that the firm wanted to enlarge its business and desired to find a purchaser for stock. He interested H. O. Hjermstad, who had recently arrived from the east, introduced him, and after a period of negotiation the visitor invested \$25... White falled to show that he had been authorized to act for the firm in securing an investor, and the court held that he had no claim on commission. He asked for \$2,500.
