that the Republicans would renominate President McKinley, and that the Democrats would again follow the leadership of Mr. Bryan. Mc-Kinley's renomination was made certain because of the great prosperity which blessed the country because of the successful issue of the war with Spain, and because of the perfection of the organization of the Republican party under Mr. Hanna and the coterie of Republican senators that stood with the administration. Bryan's renomination was made certain by his popularity with the rank and file of his party, notwithstanding the bitter and intense opposition of the "gold" Democrats.

The renomination of Bryan in 1900 is the only instance of the renomination of an unsuccessful candidate for president in the campaign next after his defeat. Jackson was a candidate in 1828 after his defeat in 1824, but as he had the plurality of both popular and electoral votes in the first race, and as there were no party nominations then, his case is not a precedent. Henry Clay was three times a candidate for president, but only once was he the recognized nominee of a party, and that was in the campaign after the one in which he was defeated for the Whig nomination by General Harrison. Grover Cleveland was nominated in 1892 after his defeat in 1888, but as he had served one term in the White House he could not be considered a wholly unsuccessful candidate.

No man who has frequently met defeat in national politics has been able to retain the leadership of one of the two great parties with the single exception of Mr. Bryan.

Between the presidential campaigns of 1896 and 1900 things had happened which were to change the whole course of American life. The struggle of Cuba for freedom from the yoke of Spain appealed to the sentiment of the American people and there was a great popular demand for interference in Cuba by our government. If the American people had known as much then as they knew now about the nature of Cuban rebellions and revolutions the whole story might te different. War was declared and in less than four months it was over. Colonel Roosevelt was already a candidate for president for the campaign of 1904. He believed that his interests could be advanced more readily if he remained governor of New York than if he were made vice-president. He protested with earnestness and vehemence. He fought as hard as he possibly could, but the enthusiasm for the one war hero who had weathered the storms of two years was so great that it could not be overcome. More especially when managed by two veteran manipulators like Platt and Quay So it was that Theodore Roosevelt was kicked upstairs and put on the shelf "where he would neverbother national politics again."

Populist Convention. The Populists held the first convention that nominated Mr. Bryan. There were several Populist conventions, but the one which was attended by the five Populist senators nominated Mr. Bryan with Charles A. Towne of Minnesota as his running mate. The Democrats met in Kansas City on July 4 and the Silver Republicans met in the same city on the same day.

There was a great fight, led by David B. Hill of New York, to prevent the specific reiteration of the free sliver plank of 1896, but Mr. Bryan insisted and the plank went in. Adlai Stevenson, who had been elected vice-president with Grover Cleveland in 1892, was given the second place on the ticket. The Sliver Republicans promptly nominated the second place on the ticket. The Silver Republicans promptly nominated the same candidates and Towne withdrew from the Populist ticket. Later in the campaign the anti-Imperialist convention met and endorsed Bryan. The Gold Democrats called a convention, but it was decided not to make any nominations. Many of the leaders of the Palmer and Buckner following came back into the party and suported Mr. Bryan but the large majority of the rank and file of the Cleveland faction went into the Republican party.

Mr. McKinley, being president, was very quiet in the campaign, but Colonel Roosevelt took, the stump and flayed Bryan with characteristic zeal.

Mr. Bryan had attempted to make "imperialism" the paramount issue in the campaign. Many conservatives were intense in their opposition to the inauguration of a colonial system. Republicans and conservative Democrats who looked upon the Bryan of 1896 with horror were willing to follow him in 1960. There is no question but that the Bryan vote among the highly educated classes was greater in the second campaign than the first.

But among other classes Mr. Bryan could not hold his own. The Republicans made the "full dinner pail" the paramount issue. As for the colonial policy, that was manifest destiny and a duty to humanity. The thing to talk


