

JESUIT SCHOOL OPEN ITS DOORS

Crowd Attends Blessing by Archbishop—Celebration at the St. Lawrence.

Archbishop Christie blessed the new Jesuit school and chapel of St. Ignatius near Creston on the Mount Scott carline yesterday afternoon in the presence of a large crowd of patrons of the institution which opened this morning for registration. Portland has been made the headquarters of the Jesuits for the state of Oregon and a handsome dwelling is being constructed from the proceeds of a residence for the Rev. George De La Motte, head of the California and Rocky mountain divisions of the order. He will make his residence here in the future. Father Dillon, the new pastor of St. Ignatius will also live in this building.

Before going out to St. Ignatius his grace, the archbishop, celebrated the solemn pontifical mass at St. Lawrence in commemoration of the Silver Jubilee of that parish. Assisting the archbishop were the following priests: Rev. J. C. Hughes, pastor of St. Lawrence, Rev. A. G. Delormier, Rev. H. S. Gallagher, Rev. Walter O'Donnell, Rev. Clem Wagner, Rev. George F. Thompson of St. Mary's cathedral. The jubilee sermon which was one of the most beautiful and eloquent heard in a pulpit of Portland for a long time. Father Thompson said in part:

"The real impediment to Catholic progress is indifference. Indifference of mind, which is physical counterpart in rounded shoulders and a hollow chest. So absolute is the certitude of the church as to her character and accidents, that she is ever ready to state her position definitely and coherently, without reservation or misgivings. She knows that the great facts which stand forth in her long and world-wide career, are of so unnatural and exceptional a character that, she herself is not to be adequately explained by reference to any human contrivance.

"Some are content to rail against her—sincere, perhaps, in their ignorance and ill-will, but the church endures their folly, lets them spend their noisy day, and then sees them terminate a season of vacuous strife. Others look at the Catholic church and then give her up as a problem and a puzzle. They admire her organization—for there is hardly a city in the world, where time has failed to place her representative—they see the splendid discipline maintained in her army, which renders maximum service for minimum recompense; they note the fact, and not without curiosity, that she has had a hold on the masses, which no other church has, that she has congregations of live, brainy men at her services, which, other churches have not; they behold the practical fruits of her endeavors—sisterhoods, hospitals, schools, asylums and so on through the list; but then they terminate their study with superficial observations, and leave off mental effort just where they should begin to delve.
