## COUNTY AND STATE CONTEST FOR TAXES

(United Press Lensed Wire.)  
Tacoma, Wash., Sept. 22.—The state railroad commissioners were today taken over the Northern Pacific waterfront by County Assessor Ralback and an effort made to convince the members that the waterfront here is real estate and not operating railroad property. Ralback holds that the property is used for commercial purposes and does not legitimately belong to railroad operation.

If the commission agrees with this view it will mean that about \$2,000,000 of the waterfront, which has heretofore been classed as operating property and has been taxed under railroad mileage, the money going to the state at large, will be cut out and will be assessed by Pierce county. This would be \$20,000 more taxes to be paid by the railroad company to the county.
