

COLUMBIA COUNTY EXHIBIT ITS PRODURES A Dangerous Attendant Symptom of Anaemia.

Under Direction of the Patrons of Husbandry, a Fair Will Be Held at Yankton—Many and Varied Displays to Be Shown.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) St. Helena, Or., Sept. 22.—The Patrons of Husbandry of Yankton, Columbia county, propose to mark a stage in the county's progress by holding a fair at their grange hall on Wednesday, September 30. Yankton is about four miles from St. Helena, the county seat, and is situated in the agricultural and horticultural country, which has been entirely created by the industry of the settlers.

Comparatively a few years ago the country was covered with a heavy growth of fir timber, and even at the present time it appears to easterners to be a rough stretch of country. Yet there are many good farms in the neighborhood and the area of cleared land is rapidly increasing.

As an apple raising country it has no superior anywhere in the world. It is largely for the purpose of demonstrating this fact that the fair project has been undertaken. Those who are interested in apple growing and the securing of cheap land for orchard purposes will be especially interested in the exhibits of the fair.

It is claimed by well informed people that an orchard of Northern Spy apples can be grown and brought to maturity out of stump land in this neighborhood.

for about 2500 an acre, and that such an orchard will yield an average net annual profit of at least \$400 per acre. During the period between planting and maturity considerable income can be derived by raising small fruits and vegetables between the rows of trees.

The Yankton people realize that their great need is an increased acreage in order that the product may be sufficient to attract the attention of buyers and encourage up to date methods of handling and marketing the fruit through an orchard association.

That the managers of the coming fair are not expecting to realize a profit is plainly evident from the fact that the admission price is one cent, and also enables the visitor to an old fashioned grange dinner. Thirty-three small money premiums are offered by the grange for exhibits of fruits (fresh and canned), vegetables, grains and grasses, cut flowers, dairy products, poultry, hog, dairy and beef cattle.

The county has several of the best herds of dairy stock in the state, and is interested in apple growing and the which is now being built from Portland north to Scappoose. It is believed a fair exhibition of the products from Multnomah county to make it self-sustaining. This matter will probably be brought up and discussed at the Yankton grange fair.
