

JOURNAL MAN AT GOLDFIELD

A Journal Representative Visits the Goldfield Mining District and Inspects the Properties of the Butte Boys Consolidated.

People who read of the strikes of fabulous richness made in the Goldfield district are as a rule reluctant to give full credence to the reports. If one stands at the top of the Annex shaft, through which the engineers work their lease, and have seen 50 buckets of ore taken out in a single day that went \$1,000 to the bucket in gold they would surely have been amazed. That this actually occurred is the claim made by the foreman of the Engineer's lease and the ore books of the parent company, the Goldfield Florence, bear out his statement. The Florence Annex took \$180,000 out of this shaft and then lost \$100,000 on account of not having an engineer familiar with quartz gold mining. The Engineer's lease has taken out approximately three quarters of a million dollars and still have four weeks to work before their lease expires and plenty of ore in sight. Through this same shaft the Butte Boys are working their lease, which adjoins both the ground of the "Annex" and "Engineer's Lease" and only a short distance from the Little Florence, which was the largest producer of any lease on the "ground."

RAY O'LIGHT PACES THE FASTEST HEAT

BAY COLT SMASHES RECORD ON WEDNESDAY

Ray O' Light, that grand son of Searchlight-Carrie B. driven by her owner, E. S. Train, established his right to the premier 2-year-old of the year yesterday when he paced the fastest mile ever done on the coast for a horse of his age. The handsome bay colt clipped a quarter of a second off the previous coast record, made last year at Santa Rosa, Cal. Incidentally the Searchlight youngster paced the fastest heat that has been made in America this season.
