Democrats and Good Government League Nominate Anti-Graft Jurist.

The convention was in striking contrast to the conventions of the Republicans and Union Labor party, where Dunne's name was received with hisses and groans.

TANGLED TONGUERS DISTRACT TACOMA

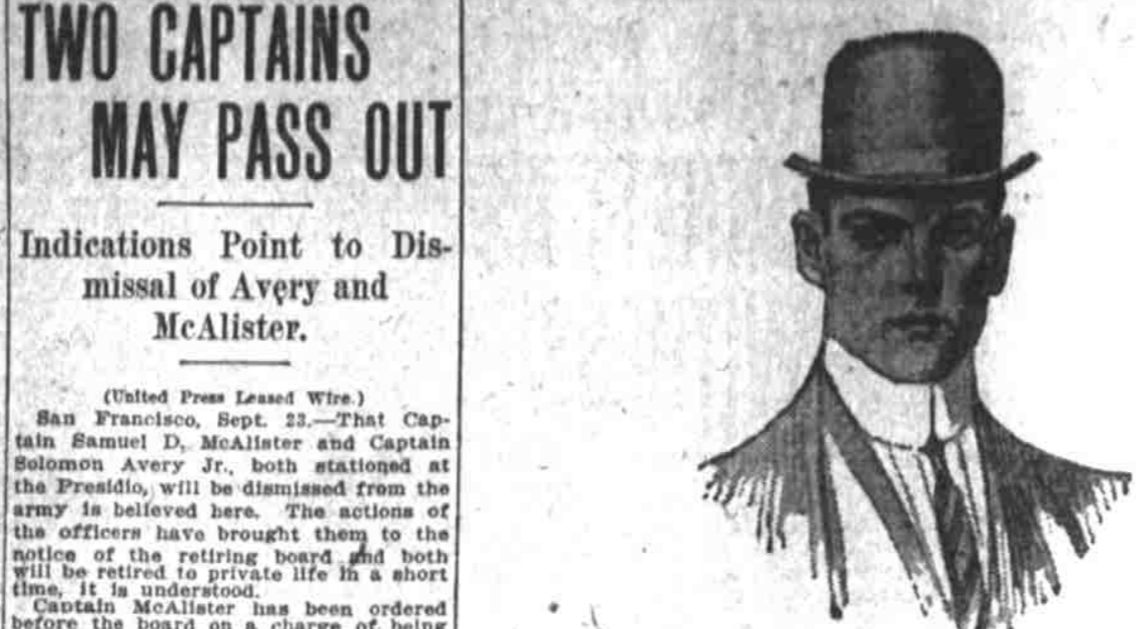
