FOURTH RACING DAY BRINGS FAST TIME

In point of speed, tomorrow's race program has everything on the boards during the week faded, for then will be decided the best horse in the 2:05 pace and the 2:10 trot. Both purses are for \$1,000.

Good racing glared marked the fourth day at the Country club track yesterday, and more records were shattered by the sterling performers at the course.

Outside of Portland day, the biggest crowd of the week was present and it was a two-horse race, with Day Break and Berta Mac the contenders, and they fought it out for five long heats before a winner was returned.

There was a change in the finishing order in the second heat, Senator Hellman's Berta Mac getting home first, closely pursued by Day Break with Nogi close up in the next heat.

McKinley Horse All the Way. Berta Mac, the brown daughter of McKinley, Albert and Berta, drove by Hellman, led all the way in the third heat, although the fleet mare might have been noosed out had not Day Break broken in the last 75 yards.

Battle Royal in Fourth. There was a battle royal in the fourth heat between Day Break and Berta Mac for first and Nogi and Emily W. for fourth. It would probably have been the most exciting and the most exciting had not the big mare broken as she faced the record stretch.

Day Break won the race by taking the final heat, which she did by a close margin over Berta Mac. The latter horse led nearly all the way around, taking the pole from Day Break in the first quarter and keeping ahead all the distance to the stretch, when the gelding closed up and they raced down the stretch neck and neck, with Berta Mac nose to the neck.

Josephine shot into the lead at the eighth in the first heat of the 2:20 class race, and was never beaten, coming under the wire a length to the good. It was different with the others. Lou Miller was a good second, Josephine in the half, when Bushnell King moved up, followed closely by Nellie Bishop.
