

# BOUGHT CANAL SHOVELS OF ENEMY TO UNIONS

### Government, Apparently Influenced by Mr. Taft, Purchased Equipment of Ohio Firm on the Unfair List, Says Portland Man.

Charles D. Heirry of this city throws some added side lights on the political situation in a letter, written to The Journal. In his letter he shows that the present administration has favored non-union manufacturers in the contracts let for steam shovels used in the construction of the Panama canal. One company mentioned is the Marion Steam Shovel company of Marion, Ohio. It is supposed that William H. Taft has some interest, either directly or indirectly, in the company, or at least that he cast his favor in it for political purposes in Ohio. In his investigation Mr. Heirry has had correspondence with the officials of the Federation of Labor of Ohio regarding the Marion Steam Shovel company. The letter written by Mr. Heirry is as follows:

many working men regret that I am forced to admit that I fail to find the words in the English language by which I could convey to you a true expression of my approval in behalf of the Chicago Federation of Labor. Fellow workmen, we are facing a great issue today and every effort is being brought to bear to deceive the working men to vote for Mr. Taft as a sincere friend of organized labor. But do not be deceived in this, as I will prove to you further on of the insincerity by the action of the present administration in connection with the Panama canal and who is coaching Mr. Taft against Mr. Bryan, the true and tried friend of the working man, while he was a member of congress.

Personal appeals and personal ambitions, individual antagonism and local prejudices, avarice, greed, bigotry and repugnance to the true spirit of the working man, is invoked to deaden real patriotism and to sacrifice every man who, in the trying hour, has dared to stand true to the rights of the working man.

Fellow workmen, how can you vote for Mr. Taft when you see the men he caters to for support in Ohio Senator Foraker, receiving \$15,000.

\$14,800 and so on to kill legislative bills objectionable to the Standard Oil monopoly. Then how can you expect voters from such a combination of political buccannars as Joe Cannon, Foraker and other standstillers, backed by an immense army of money, to hold that it openly drives the people to interfere with its depredations, holding over them a menace of panic, the threat of a stoppage of the wheels of industry, if its acts of plunder and graft be increased with by the election of Mr. Bryan? This must will see to the prosperity of the few against the masses. Now watch how the wind blows. Before election we are called understandable citizens during the Haywood and Moyer trial. I quote from The Journal of July 26, 1907, of a case in Douglas, Arizona: "Miners condemn unjust works. Recent reference to Mexican members as Moyers and Haywoods of Mazatlan. Gompers is all wrong, insincere and what right has he to advise workmen as how to vote, as Mr. Bryan's anti-injunction plank is worthless. The Earl of Chatham, England's great statesman, once said: "Show me the laws of a country and I will show you the conditions of the people living out on this proposition we are led to believe that no period of our history has been marked by such general dissatisfaction. # WOMEN BARRED FROM SALOONS

### Council Passes New Ordinance and Female Drinkers Must Go Thirsty.

After turning down two ordinances aimed at the exclusion of women from the saloons, the council surprised itself and everybody else late yesterday afternoon at its closing session by the passage of a measure which the city attorney says can be enforced, and which its framers believe to be the remedial legislation long sought by those who desire to see women barred from saloons.

The ordinance also excludes young men under 21 years of age from entering boxes in restaurants that have not 400 square feet of floor space at least.

Mrs. Lola C. Baldwin, who has worked for the past three years to secure saloon regulations that would be upheld with a firm hand, was the most pleased person in the city yesterday afternoon when the vote was taken on the new ordinance. The action of the council was warmly commended by her, and she said that in her opinion the ordinance would result in the betterment of the conditions throughout the city.

Councilman Cellars introduced the ordinance. The vote was 8 to 5, as follows:

# DECLINES TO ENTER A CHARGE OF GRAFT

The charges made against Hydrant Inspector Phillips of the fire department that he is interested in a local company which wishes to sell hydrants to the city have practically been withdrawn, as J. G. Shans, manager of the Ludlow Valve & Manufacturing company, whose representative, W. O. Haines, made the charges last Saturday, declined to make good Haines' charges before the committee yesterday afternoon. Mayor Lane asked Shans if he would make a charge of graft against Phillips, but Shans did not accept the invitation.

The responsibility for the delay in testing and accepting the hydrants furnished by the contractors last May and allowed to rust and lay idle during the summer while a cry went up all over the city for water was at last determined. It was decided that the water department, the mayor, the fire committee, Chief Campbell and the contractors are all to blame.

# VAUGHN'S BILL SNOWED UNDER

"The public, it has suffered long," was the theme which occupied the attention of the council during all of the latter portion of the morning and far into the afternoon session when the councilmen wrangled and fumed over a resolution introduced by Mr. Vaughn calling upon the city attorney to prepare an amendment to certain sections of the so-called "bitulithic ordinance" prohibiting the executive board from letting further pavement contracts for more than \$1.50 a yard.

After the customary verbal repartee between opposing factions, the majority finally voted down the resolution. Vaughn addressed some pertinent remarks to Cellars in which he referred to that gentleman as being interested in the Warren Construction company at which the Vaughn resolution was aimed. Vaughn, who is backed by Kellaher, declared this morning that he would keep hammering at the Warren company until the ordinance is repealed. He confidently exclaimed that the ordinance will be taken off the books by Christmas.

"You can laugh," said Vaughn to

Cellars, at the council meeting, "but the men who vote this resolution down will be cursed and damned for their action by the people of the city and an investigation of the Warren Construction company is bound to come."

The opponents of the resolution explained their vote by saying they did not favor it because it was intended to put the company out of business before making an investigation of how much money it is making.
