Wild West Show Most Remarkable of the Kind Ever Assembled.

Colonel William F. Cody, "Buffalo Bill," will be seen in Portland this afternoon after an interval of three years. He comes after an extraordinary season at Madison Square Garden, New York, and at three alternate encampments in Chicago, where thousands were unable to obtain admission. When the nations beyond the seas find instruction and delight in the wild west there must be something exceptional in its features. This is easily explained by the fact that this exhibition of life in the old far west, when men took their lives and those of their loved ones in their hands to establish homes on the great plains, is real, actual and truthful. Realism here finds its highest type, the most simple and faithful that can be conceived.

Real Indian chiefs, braves, squaws and papooses, real Mexican vaqueros, real cowboys and real ranch girls, real cavalry of the United States, England, Germany, Japan, South America, Arabia and Russia; these are all here, there is no limitation, no claptrap. the state because to do so would entail the exercise of the right of eminent domain. Under the constitution no such right could be given to an outside corporation.

The clash occurred over this point of law, as I understand it. I would not pretend to say which is right because I have not looked into the law, or examined the briefs or studied the question. It has all come up since I have been away from home. The Prairie Oil & Gas company is a Standard Oil property. I do not know what connection, if any, Governor Haskell has or might have with the company.

The senator also discussed the bank guarantee plan briefly. He used the Oklahoma situation as an example and said that the working of the state guarantee system in Oklahoma was very satisfactory so far as it had gone.

"Money is coming into the state from the outside and the 37 national banks are reorganizing and coming out as state banks, abandoning their charters as national banks to do so."

"There is nothing in the argument that the guarantee of bank deposits would put a premium on wild cat banking," said the senator. "The meeting starts in to rib his depositors it is foolish to argue that he would desire to guarantee their deposits to them."

"It is a fact that the guarantee plan causes conservative banking and not the reverse. It causes the bankers to watch each other and see that none engaged in the banking business get into the breaking. Bankers know much quicker than the general public when some institution is conducting a shaky business. If they have to contribute to guarantee bank deposits all of them will see to it that the banking business is conducted on safe lines. This means much more strict examination."

"What is true in the state guarantee system would be true in the national. The one is working most admirably in Oklahoma and the other would do the same in the nation."

EXPENSES, \$4,770; SALARY, \$4,800

M. E. Hay, Republican, Holds Campaign Spend Record in Washington.

Olivette, Wash., Sept. 25.—M. E. Hay, successful candidate for the Republican nomination as lieutenant governor, holds the record of all candidates for money expended in his campaign of those who have so far reported.

Mr. Hay certifies to expenditures aggregating \$4,770, in addition to which there is a bill of \$50 in dispute because the services rendered were not satisfactory. Mr. Hay also states that numerous payments for meals, while campaigning, were overlooked.

The total salary for the four years' term to which Mr. Hay will be elected will be \$4,800, so the cost to him of the nomination will exceed the total salary for the term, while he has yet to pay his November election campaign expenses. The total expenditures of all candidates who have filed expense accounts to date is \$23,424.42. This includes the non-partisan judicial candidates and the Democrats, Governor Meacham's secretary, Mr. H. H. Ingersoll, having certified to personal and Mead club expenditures aggregating \$5,562.25.

MONNETT REFUSES WORK WITH HASKELL
