Judge Gantenbein in the circuit yesterday afternoon forfeit the \$750 deposited for Mrs. Belle Wayman as security for her appearance to serve four months in jail for her part in the conspiracy to injure Mayor Lane's reputation. The money will go into the county treasury, swelling the receipts of the circuit court department for the month. Mrs. Wayman was last heard from in Missouri. If she ever returns to Oregon she can be put in jail without ceremony, notwithstanding the forfeiture of her bail.

R. B. Poucher who lives at 165 Porter street, has registered a complaint at police headquarters to the effect that the small boy who lives in his neighborhood are very troublesome. Poucher says that they congregate in front of his building and remain there until late hours every evening, shouting and raising a general disturbance. It is almost impossible for him to sleep. The chief of police has notified the neighborhood watchman to beat to give the matter attention.

A case in which trespass was taken last May and left unfinished was resumed before Judge Bronough in the circuit court this morning. The plaintiff is A. G. Hill, who claims that E. Goodwin owes him \$72 on a contract for cutting and hauling wood from 78 acres of land near Gladstone, in Clackamas county. He alleges that the defendant repudiated the contract. Hill claims that he had a settlement with Hill and paid him all that was due.

The Forty-fifth Precinct Republican club held a meeting last night in Merrill's hall. Colonel D. J. Haynes, who used to live in Kentucky, and who is now in the evening. There was a fair-sized crowd present, and the colonel delivered one of the good old "bloody shirt" addresses of the money. He went down the line in denunciation of everything opposed to the Republican platform. He called on the people to support Mr. Taft. W. G. Hale also spoke.

H. W. Stone, general secretary of the Y. M. C. A., will speak at the regular men's meeting on the subject of "The Problem of Making a Better Living." The address, as well as about decorations, music and program of the meeting, has been arranged by the educational committee. It is understood that Mr. Stone will speak on the subject of "Education and training in securing a better living." It may be that it will touch on the labor situation.

Expecting that the case will be settled out of court, the attorneys in the case of Selma Rees against the Southern Pacific were ready to discontinue without delay after part of the testimony had been heard. She sued for \$5,288 damages for injury to her tail in a collision near Cottage Grove last year. The basis of settlement tentatively agreed on was a payment of \$1,250 to Mrs. Rees.

Officers of the Rose society were elected last night for the ensuing year as follows: President, Mrs. John W. Minor; first vice-president, Mrs. J. Mann; second vice-president, Mrs. George H. Lamberson; secretary, Mrs. Herbert Holman; treasurer, Mrs. Campbell; and Mrs. E. B. MacFarland. The executive committee will be announced later.

George von L. Meyer, postmaster-general of the United States, through his attorneys in Portland, has appealed the case of the Hot Springs Improvement company, involving the Klamath county, in the circuit court of appeals of the Ninth district. The suit is one in equity to remove a cloud from the title. Last March Judge Wolverton decided the case in favor of the improvement company.

The Oregon State Equal Suffrage association will meet tonight at 8 o'clock in the committee room of the city hall to make plans for the coming campaign. Addresses are to be made by Dr. L. Elliot, C. E. Young, Mrs. Millie R. Trumbull, Mrs. Sarah A. Evans, Dr. Mary Thompson and others, and business transacted. The invitation is general.

Thomas G. Farrell has applied for letters on the estate of George B. Beal, who died at Pillar Rock a short time ago. The property is valued at \$27,000, consisting of money, stocks and notes. The heirs are four others, a sister and the widow, a deceased brother, all residing in Northumberland, England. R. Everding, R. S. Farrell and John Swain have been named as executors.

Fire Chief Campbell yesterday reported at a meeting of the executive board that there are about 400 people standing the city that should be put out down as they serve no useful purpose and are in the way. The city will probably give the companies giving the poles 10 days' notice and then if they are not removed will take steps to remove them itself.

According to the report of the fire chief the condition of the Bungalow and Baker theatres, which were inspected by him, were found to be in compliance with the law. The chief took occasion to deplore the fact, however, that the law pertaining to the erection of frame buildings for theatres.
