

CHEHALIS BASEBALL TEAM HOLDS WORLD'S RECORD FOR VICTORIES



(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Chehalis, Wash., Sept. 26.—The Chehalis baseball team holds the world's record for number of straight games won by either amateur or professional clubs, having won twenty-seven games without a defeat, and playing against the best clubs in Southwestern Washington, and some of the crack Tri-City league teams. The club also holds the pennant for Southwestern Washington. The city of Chehalis has given loyal support to the team, and the club has one of the fastest ball grounds in the state, Millet Field, which was donated to the city as a park and play ground by the late D. C. Millet.

Part of the team is composed of ex-leaguers who are well known throughout the coast, Quick, Nehring, Adams, McCarty, the veteran shortstop, Ruff, Burnett and Osborne. The team has been especially strong in the box with Osborne, Burnett, Adams, Osborne, leading in the number of games pitched. The season closes here tomorrow with a game with Elsie reinforced by the best players in Hoquiam and Aberdeen.

KINSELLA'S TEAMMATES HELP TO WIN

Eddie Kinsella helped Portland on her way to the top yesterday, when he held the Oakland team to eight scattered hits while his teammates hit Christian in bunches. Christian was wild as a March hare, and issued seven bases on balls, hit Graney with the ball and made two wild pitches. Portland's hits came right after his wild streaks and netted it seven runs.

Kinsella, and Danzig were jointly to blame for all three of the tallies scored by the southerners for the way the pair worked together around first base was a fright. In the sixth Truesdale missed them up with his easy hand, and eventually scored and the same sort of play started Cook on his way in the eighth. Both men should have been easy outs but both Kinsella and Danzig tried to field the ball and the men were safe.

Graney was at bat in the place and Tom Madden broke into the game for the first time since last Sunday. Madden hit in great style today and although he is credited with only two hits he met the ball fairly every time and only good fielding cut him off from scoring. Madden's second home run in center field but did nicely at the bat, getting a nice single in the seventh. Helme, Heltmuller was Truesdale's mainstay, and he was successful in his runs and tallied himself with another. The big hit was 1,000 today and all his hits were clean.

Casey was there with his usual walk in the first inning and we got off on the right foot. Christian's first out was to the surface right there, for with Cooney to sacrifice he threw the ball miles over LaLongo's head and both men were safe. Cooney's sacrifice hit in the leg with one of Christian's wild ones. Johnson tried to steal third on LaLongo's catch.

The second proved to be Christian's Jonah. Inning for he lost his bearings completely and four runs were scored. With McCready on first, second base passed Bassey. Madden slammed hot ones at Hogan and the latter in his hurry to make a double play fumbled and both men were safe. Onella tried to hunt twice and on the third strike drove a single into right field. Madden, Danzig, Truesdale, and Smith lined one straight at Danzig and Hogan was caught off first. Danzig doubled and Truesdale hit in the third but Johnson retired Truesdale. SOME MOTOR WISDOM

It is best to treat old tires like aged people, and not work either of them too hard. Wise racing drivers now wear caps with ear rolls to enable them to hear a car coming up from the rear.

Half the accidents to motor cars are caused by men who get nowhere faster than other men try to get anywhere. Whatever may be the temptation, the driver is foolish who looks back while running at full, or even half speed.

The Exmoor section of Devonshire in England will never be greatly troubled by motorists, for few are so unmerciful to their cars as to ask them to scale the mountain sides that rise sharply from Bristol channel.

An up-to-date wedding party drove to get 700 of the 800 automobiles in that city to parade during exposition week for the purchase of ten motor patrol automobiles, the chauffeurs wearing white caps and coats with large white chrysanthemums in the button holes.

One of the leading automobile publications of England proposes to give a series of lectures on the motor car, the centers this fall on the working of the motor car, and if they succeed will take up other cities in a spring.

There was such a tremendous crowd at the outlay races on the Brighton Beach track near New York that it is believed it will have some effect in bringing the Automobile Club of America and the American Automobile association to terms.

Park Superintendent M. H. West of Chicago does not believe that chains tires tear up a road any more than ordinary rubber ones, his theory being that the vacuum caused by the rubber tires exerts more drawing power on loose material than the chain.

The lord chief justice of Ireland spent part of his vacation in London and brought his automobile with him, the result being a collision at Hyde Park corner the first day he was out and an animated expatriation of himself from any imputation of negligence.

The Motorists Purchasing association of England, which has been running for a year and has a membership of over 2,000, has shown that spare parts and accessories can be purchased at a saving of three-fourths on orders of \$125 and two-thirds on amounts less than that.

A Hungarian has invented a machine by which it is claimed to read 10,000 words an hour may be sent over the telephone.

When the brake slips the best thing to do is to examine carefully the friction surfaces first, and failing to find anything there to cause the trouble look next to see that nothing hinders the contact when the pedal or lever is thrown into position.

A speed indicator to show various colored disks in the daytime and colored lights at night, any of which would be easier to distinguish than figures, has been suggested by a motorist who has been bothered by some of the present styles of speedometers.

A good thing to have in the tool box is a small piece of fine wire gauge fashioned into a funnel that will be fastened to the motorist's belt, and the reservoir, all waste, grit and other foreign substances being kept out of the cylinder by the use of this simple little device.

There is no bishop in England who has traveled so much in the last four years as Dr. Yeatman-Biggs of the diocese of Worcester, and it is due to the fact that he is an expert motorist.

English county authorities are wont to be extremely careful in the matter of the roads to the prevalence of automobiles, but there are just as many of them where the motor cars are never used.

City officials who have studied the subject are certain that no mechanical device will ever entirely supersede the horse, and for that reason streets will have to be built for the use of both.
