

IMPROVED BLAZING CABINET

Vancouver Woman Fatally Burned—Man Who Attempted Rescue Dead.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.)
 Vancouver, Wash., Sept. 29.—James Manning, a well-known resident of Vancouver met a horrible death last night while trying to rescue Mrs. E. J. Green from the blazing frame of a bath cabinet. Manning died in great agony an hour after the accident, while Mrs. Green is in a critical condition and in most respects to the hospital and had been attended to by Mrs. Green for some time. Yesterday evening he accompanied her to the home of Mrs. J. Brown, who has been giving Mrs. Green vapor baths as a treatment for the ailment with which she was suffering.

While giving the treatment Mrs. Brown attempted to refill the tank supplying the lamp of the bath cabinet with gasoline. She refilled the tank and had just left the room when there was a loud explosion and the unfortunate sufferer was enveloped in the blazing oil.

Entangled in the flaming frame of the bath cabinet, Mrs. Green was helpless, and Manning, answering her screams, rushed to her aid. Manning battled with the blazing frame, and in tearing it from around Mrs. Green saturated his clothing with the blazing gasoline. With the aid of neighbors who had been summoned by the cries of Mrs. Green, the fire was extinguished, and in the excitement both Manning and Mrs. Green were left unattended. When they were discovered by firemen some time later Manning was beyond medical aid, dying a short time after being removed to St. Joseph's hospital. Mrs. Green was also in a serious condition.

The burns from the blazing gasoline extended over the entire bodies of both Manning and Mrs. Green, while bits of glass from the bursting lamps had been driven deep into the flesh.

It was 40 minutes before the assistance of physicians could be secured. Dr. Pompe was the first to arrive, and attempted to relieve the sufferings of Manning and Mrs. Green, but before Manning was beyond medical assistance. At the hospital no hope is held out for the recovery of Mrs. Green.

KERMIT ROOSEVELT PRAISED AS HUNTER

Captain Bullock said that when Kermit was in the west he located a wild buffalo bull which the owners agreed was dangerous and he and Kermit agreed to allow Kermit to kill it.

Captain Bullock told his young charge about the chance for a fine shot and Kermit sighted on the animal. Then he said:

"If the last wild buffalo bull must be killed, I'll not be the one to do it," and Kermit refused to shoot.

Captain Bullock declared that Kermit was a fine shot.

NO HEARST TICKET ON IDAHO BALLOT

Fire in Chinatown.

 San Francisco, Sept. 29.—The whole Chinese quarter of this city was threatened with destruction by fire today when a blaze, supposed to have been caused by spontaneous combustion, started in the basement of a building occupied by Yow Yee, 717 Dupont street, destroying almost the entire building and entailing a loss of \$150,000. The excitement was caused among the celestials by a rumor that 10 Chinese employees had been hanged in the fire and burned to death. It was learned after the fire had been extinguished that they escaped.

CREWS WORK IN DEEP CANYON



A dozen crews of railroad surveyors are working at present southward from the Columbia river towards Bend in Crook county. The larger part of these are running lines in the canyon of the Deschutes river, which offers a natural passage way from the mouth of the Deschutes to the inland in the vicinity of the mouth of Trout creek west of Madras.

The photograph shows the wide and deep canyon near the mouth of White river, midway between the Columbia and trout creek, where engineers are active in finishing permanent surveys. Both the Harriman and Oregon Trunk surveyors are hastening their work in completing their final locations preparatory to beginning construction into the central part of the state.

MISSING MINISTER MAY HAVE GONE DOWN TO CALIFORNIA

No trace has yet been found of Rev. George H. Houghton, the aged Methodist minister who so mysteriously disappeared September 18, and some of his friends fear that he has met with foul play or that a serious accident has happened to him.

Rev. T. M. Ford of 186 East Thirty-fifth street, however, at whose house the missing minister stayed for a while, is confident that no harm has befallen him.

"I think he has gone to California," he said. "He's all right. He had been promising a good many thousands of dollars to various churches and colleges, and I don't think he was worth much."

"You mean you think he was not just right in the head?" Mr. Ford was asked. "Well, you can make your own inferences," he replied.

There is in the morgue the unidentified body of an old man, and it was thought at first that this might be Houghton's body. He was found in the park with a bullet hole in his head, plainly a case of suicide. He was about 6 feet 10 1/2 inches in height and had white hair and a white mustache. But Rev. Mr. Ford says that Mr. Houghton wore no mustache—at least, he is pretty sure he did not—and thinks there is no possibility of the body in the morgue being that of the missing minister.

Rev. Houghton left Portland, presumably, on September 18 to attend the Methodist conference at Salem. He has not been heard from or of since.

GENERAL DELIVERY OPEN TILL MIDNIGHT, NEW CLERKS PUT ON

Six additional clerks are to go to work at the Portland postoffice Thursday morning, October 1.

Upon the same date the general delivery and the stamp windows will be kept open until midnight.

July 1, 12 clerks from the Portland office were allowed by the department. Six of them were put to work almost immediately. The order provided that the others shouldn't report for duty until fall.

The clerks who go to work Thursday morning were selected from the civil service list of successful applicants who have been waiting. Those who head the list for the positions are: Robert E. Rowe, Irma Riches, Edgar Verry, Austin T. Farrens, Earl J. Sperry and Melville D. Teats.

These clerks start in on salaries of \$600 each.

The general delivery windows, which are now usually crowded during the hours of the day and evening, owing to the idea of keeping open until 12 o'clock at night, will benefit by the order owing to the fact that many persons who have been going to the office in the day will call for their mail at night.

NOT A BULLET HOLE IN WALLS HARNEY COUNTY'S ANNUAL FAIR ON

Thomas' Self-Defense Story Not Confirmed—First Degree Charge.

 Bellingham, Wash., Sept. 29.—A charge of murder in the first degree was filed against J. K. Thomas, slayer of Mrs. Grenada Thomas, whose body was found buried in the back yard of her home Saturday afternoon. It is believed that the prosecuting attorney will have difficulty in convicting Thomas on this charge in the face of the fact that the prisoner has confessed the murder. Thomas claims that he shot in self-defense and will fight the case on this ground.

The plain clothes men went to the house today for the purpose of hunting for a hole in the walls which might have been left by the woman's bullet, had she fired, as her murderers stated. Although they looked carefully over every inch of space they found no such mark, and they are inclined to look upon this as a conclusive disproof of his story.

The strong point in the defense is, of course, the absence of witnesses and the consequent impossibility of proving that the story is untrue. The police find it necessary to take more than two tablets for complete relief."
