

### ROB HONEY TREE; DAMAGE WIRES

#### Hunters Destroy Hood River County's Famed Bee Storehouse.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.)  
Hood River, Or., Oct. 1.—Hood River county officers are looking for unknown persons who caused big damage to the wires of the Hood River Electric Light & Power company and the Pacific States Telephone company by cutting down a big fir tree containing many hundreds of pounds of honey early Wednesday morning. The tree was situated several miles from Hood River on the property of J. W. Morton and in falling smashed through the wires of the telephone company, cutting off the long distance connection with Portland for a day and breaking the cables of the power company. The latter supplies the big planer of the Stanley-Smith Lumber company at Southton with power, and until repairs were made work at the mill was suspended.

The honey hunters are said to have taken a great risk as the current running through the power cables is 660 volts. Investigation shows that the tree fell at 2:25, as the break in the connection blew out a fuse in the power-house at that hour. Workmen who were sent to the scene of the trouble to make repairs were delayed for several hours by the vicious attacks of enormous swarms of bees. It was not until late in the day that they were able to complete their task.

### SHAKES OWL FROM TREE IN DAYTIME



A big horned owl being carried around the streets during the day, by Ralph C. Loomis, has attracted a great deal of attention from passersby. Loomis caught the bird last week at Gray's landing on the Columbia and brought him to Portland. Loomis was passing a clump of bushes last week and noticed the bird perched in the branches, vigorously shaking of the branches dislodged the bird, and Loomis had it by the wings before it could get away.

### LETTER TO ENGLAND ONLY 2 CENTS NOW

Five persons appeared at the postoffice with letters yesterday and wanted to know when the 2-cent rate with England went into effect. Told that it was today, October 1, they said they guessed their letters could wait—but the only difference was 3 cents. And so they went away only to return this morning.

But these were not the only persons awaiting the new agreement between Great Britain and the United States postal authorities to go into effect. In all several hundred letters for European addresses were mailed at the Portland postoffice today.

The 2-cent rate includes England, Scotland, Wales and Ireland. Letters from these countries may be sent to the United States for the same amount.

The rate was formerly 5 cents. The new agreement applies to letters only.
