## MORAN IS DECLARED WINNER OVER HANLO

### Little Briton Leads Over Californian in Every Round but 13th.

(United Press Leased Wire.)  
San Francisco, Oct. 1.—Eddie Hanlon, California's former great lightweight, lost the decision after 20 rounds of terrible milling last night to Owen Moran, the English featherweight champion. Hanlon weighed the force of the blow more than Moran and to this is probably attributed the fact that he was now knocked out. Eddie's horse was all that kept him going, for he was cut into shreds by the wicked blows of a Briton.

Things broke favorably for the Californian in only one round, but Moran covered up in time to prevent any serious damage to himself. This was in the thirteenth. Hanlon backed the "Turriner" into a neutral corner and when Owen tried to escape shot a terrific right to the stomach. Moran brought up in the center of the ring, and Hanlon tried to escape about a foot into the center of the ring. Moran worried considerably. He backed off and covered himself to escape further punishment.

After the fourth round came back strong and pecked Eddie time and again. Hanlon's face and nose were split by Moran's wicked blows, but his nerve kept him going to the end. He rushed Moran repeatedly, but the smaller fighter ward off any damaging blows, at the same time coming back with jolts which jarred Hanlon.

It was the general opinion that Moran should have been awarded the decision and Referee Smith's action in declaring Moran the winner was approved. It was the exception of the one round Moran had the better of the fight all the way through and that was only Hanlon's great nerve that kept him going.

It will take several days before the entire list of entries will have reached the Hunt Club rooms. Only a few of the out-of-town entries have been received, although the notices of telegraph has been made by the owner. Seattle again will send in a long list of entries. Messrs. Farrell and Conside have entered their stables, in every class they could possibly enter. Miss Bernice Baker, Tacoma, has entered her stable in 21 classes and as her stable is made up of handsome show-ring horses the classes in which she has entered will prove a decided drawing card.

The reserved seat sale will take place on Monday at Rowe & Martin's drug store. Most of the boxes have already been sold and the demand has been so great that the club could have sold an additional fifty boxes were it possible to get them around the show ring.
