Now the happy couple are on their honeymoon, the bridegroom knowing that his only dotage is the way in which he dotes upon his beaming wife. **POLICE SNUFF RED LIGHTS OF PENDLETON** (Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Pendleton, Or., Oct. 2.—For the first time in a generation Pendleton has no redlight district. Yesterday saw the passing of the tenderloin, when, in accordance with the orders of Mayor Murphy, the dens on Cottonwood street were abandoned. Mayor Murphy's orders were directed against the crime, and provided that no questionable resort could be opened to the street on the ground floor. The police declared this morning that

the orders had had the effect of driving out all but four of the known habitués of the tenderloin. **COLONEL STEWART UNDER EXAMINATION** Washington, Oct. 2.—Colonel William F. Stewart was before the medical members of the retiring board again today and a further examination of his condition was made. The final examination of the army officer, who has been in practical exile at Fort Grant, Ariz., for several years, will probably be made tomorrow. It is probable that the report of the full board will be made to the war department Monday. The officials have refused to give out the results of the tests so far.

CARS COLLIDE, FOUR INJURED (United Press Leased Wire.) Los Angeles, Oct. 2.—Four persons were injured today, one of them seriously, when a Southern Pacific engine collided with a streetcar at Third and Alameda streets. The injured: A. G. Williamson, motorman, slight

Bennett, who witnessed the accident, declares it was caused by Williamson's negligence in failing to bring his car to a full stop before reaching the crossing.
