THREATENED TO KILL TOO MANY TIMES

Mose McCrum, who is said by the officers to be a bad man with a record, appeared in the justice court this morning, having been arrested on a warrant sworn to by S. R. Barnes. Barnes alleges that McCrum threatened to kill him, and he is charged with keeping the belligerent McCrum from carrying the threat into execution. McCrum is already under bonds in Columbia county to keep the peace, having been arrested there on complaint of his wife who said that he had threatened to kill her. It is feared that if he is allowed to remain at large McCrum may carry some of his threats into effect. He was released this morning on \$500 bonds after having entered a plea of not guilty. He will be arraigned Thursday morning.

BOUGHT STOCK AND NOW WANTS COIN BACK

Charging that T. A. Garbade falsely represented the value of shares in the Portland Coffee & Spice company, consequently causing him to purchase 200 shares of the stock, D. L. Van de Wiele is suing in the circuit court today to recover \$2,150 which he claims for the stock at \$100 per share. Van de Wiele alleges that the company is not a paying concern, such as Garbade claimed to be, and asserts that he lost much money on the purchase of the shares. He asks the court to allow him to refund the shares to Garbade and force the defendant to pay him back his \$2,150.

DR. FRANKLIN GOES TO INSANE ASYLUM

Three more cases of insanity have been brought before the sanity commis-

sion and the unfortunates committed to the asylum. Dr. Harry Franklin who, it is said, had a hand too lavish for his pocketbook and who frequently beat his mother, was adjudged insane and taken to the state institution. Margaret Retelsick, aged 90, who lived at 48 East Fourteenth street north, has lost her mind from old age and was committed, as was Joe Protanis, a coal miner who came here recently from Pittsburgh. He was found on the street.

Charles H. Baker. (Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Eugene, Or., Oct. 2.—Charles H. Baker, 64 years, a prominent citizen of Eugene, died at his home in this city yesterday from a stroke of apoplexy. He had been a resident of Eugene since 1898, coming from a farm in the McKenzie valley, where he settled a few years before. He was born in Pennsylvania and served four years in the Fifth Pennsylvania cavalry in the civil war. He was a former member of the Oregon legislature from Lane county, being elected to the house of representatives in 1896. He served two terms. He was a prominent worker in G. A. R. and Masonic circles.
