

POISONOUS FANGS ARE FATAL BIG BRASS BAND AT THE U. OF O.

Richard Troxel After Hours of Suffering Succumbs to Bite of Rattlesnake—Poison Reaches Heart of Repetitive "Charmer."

Struggling between life and death for more than 14 hours, being delirious most of the night, and during which time every known scientific method for the treatment of the deadly rattlesnake bite was administered by experienced hands, Richard Troxel, a showman, bitten yesterday afternoon in the basement of the Wells-Fargo building by a reptile of this species that he had been handling, died early this morning at the Good Samaritan hospital.

office for the purpose of examining the crawlers to see how much they were worth to him. Troxel thought naturally that the snakes had been "fixed." Under ordinary circumstances all snakes shipped from that part of the country, where they are captured, are freed of their fangs and of their poison bags. Believing this to be a fact in this case, Troxel handled the reptiles carelessly as he had done for years.

Snake a Monster. The snake which administered the deadly sting is an unusually large one, having in the neighborhood of 12 rattles and a button. It was shipped from Brownsville, Texas, to Portland, consigned to F. Ritchie, a showman, living in Sellwood.

When the big rattlesnake struck him on the right hand he said the bite would amount to nothing. However, he began to suck the wound vigorously, and at the same time putting the snake back in the box with the other hand. Within five minutes the man was unconscious.
